## SHIFTING GEARS IN 2020

We welcome you back to the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix. It's wonderful to be able to return to our annual program of vintage car events that raise funds for charity.

For us as well as you, last year was extraordinary in every aspect. Because of Covid-19 restrictions, we were unable to stage any of our regular events. For the first time in 38 years, there was no vintage car race in Schenley Park. We didn't race at Pittsburgh International Race Complex, either. Nor were we able to hold our black-tie gala, our elegant jet center party, or our car shows in Shadyside and at

the Waterfront.

This was a crippling blow to our mission of raising funds for charity, and a major hit for both the Merakey Allegheny Valley School and the Autism Society of Pittsburgh, who share and depend on the hundreds of thousands of dollars PVGP events raise each year.

But then our volunteers, entrants, and car club partners stepped forward, and helped us shift gears in 2020. While we couldn't hold our regular events, they made amazing efforts to keep the Grand Prix spirit alive.

For instance -

 Sixteen racers generously gave their 2020 race entry fees, even though they had no race. That meant a more than \$10,000 donation.

- Even though the Walnut Street Car Show was cancelled, a group of enthusiasts, led by Greg Farrell brought their cars to Shadyside, parked at the meters and brought donations to the sidewalk tables at Cappy's Cafe.
- Ed Rice and the Porsche Club held Parade Laps in Schenley Park on what would have been race day. It raised more than \$6,000.
- 15 car clubs held tours, rallys, car shows or fundraisers that exceeded \$20,000 and kept the Grand Prix spirit alive throughout the region.
- Bentley Pittsburgh hosted a car show at its dealership that brought in \$8,000. With an auction of her handmade glass art, Terri Hohmann added another \$3,500; and a group of neighbors of the president of the Rolls Royce Club, calling themselves the, "Little Miss Cookie Squad," baked and sold cookies to kick in another \$1,000.



Dan DelBianco, PVGP Executive Director, spoke for the whole organization when he said, "In a year where everything was turned upside down it was heartening to see our car community step up to create events and make the efforts to get out in their cars and raise funds for our charity partners. The generosity of our volunteers, racers, car clubs and sponsors was overwhelming."



Joseph S. Martz, president of Merakey Allegheny Valley School said, "We are incredibly grateful to the PVGP and its supporters for putting your hearts and souls into the 'Shifting Gears' campaign." Jesse Torisky, CEO of the Autism Society of Pittsburgh, declared, "During this pandemic, autistic people haven't stopped being autistic and they need our services more now than ever; and likewise, the PVGP supporters have not stopped working - we are humbled by their tireless efforts."

The Autism Society of Pittsburgh - a chapter of the Autism Society of America - addresses the needs of individuals with autism through a comprehensive array of information, advocacy and referral services, provided to their families and the caring professionals and service providers who work with them. This includes creating, developing and improving programs and approaches in diagnosis, treatment, education, training and social adjustment.

Autism is a neurological disorder that impairs behavior and communication; often tragically. More than 9,000 families in Southwestern Pennsylvania have children with this disability-close to 5,000 alone in Allegheny countyaccording to a 2011 census. That number has only increased; in 2018 the CDC indicated a national rate of 1 in 59 births are children with autism. Their families are often overwhelmed by the enormous task of discerning and providing for their complex needs.



Merakey Allegheny Valley School provides quality programs and facilities to help nearly 800 adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities to live with purpose and dignity. Their individualized services provide opportunities and choices that promote growth and independence.

PVGP contributions cover critical expenditures that Medicaid does not reimburse, including therapeutic equipment, new program development, facility improvements and renovations, and so much more. Recent support from the PVGP has made an impact in Western Pennsylvania by helping Merakey AVS to create outdoor living and recreational spaces, and make improvements that provide greater accessibility in their homes and on their campuses.

# 2021 PVGP POSTER ARTIST

Behind the Wheel with Poster Artist Dwight Knowlton



Dwight Knowlton, this year's poster artist, is a dad, husband, and passionate car guy who resides in Arizona. He is also a big PVGP supporter.

The 2021 poster features a 1957 Corvette racing past Phipps Conservatory in Schenley Park. Few people know that the C1 Corvettes made from 1953 through 1962 with engines under 283 cubic inches are eligible to race there and have!

Dwight created the poster last year for the 2020 event that had to be cancelled. Slight changes were made to change the car number to 39 and it became our official 2021 poster. Dwight also sketched a Historics poster for this year, but he is in such high demand by corporations and automotive customers that he was not able to complete the art. PVGP creative director Dan Holmes completed the poster and we ended up with a second great poster. It features the 1963 Corvette Z06 owned here in Pittsburgh by CJ Titterington. See the article on that interesting car on page 112.

This is the second time that Dwight Knowlton has created our poster. Dwight illustrated our 2015 'The Marques of Italy' poster. It was one of our most popular.



Dwight has been incredibly generous sharing his talents and his passion for vintage cars with the Grand Prix. The work he has created for us on posters, t-shirts, hats and decals are easy to see and appreciate, but Dwight has done so much more.

Carpe Viam means "Seize the Road" or "Enjoy the




Journey" and it is more than just the clever Latin name of Dwight's publishing company. It's his philosophy – his motto.

Dwight is also an award-winning writer. In his own

"The Little Red Racing Car is a gift for my son - and for everyone








Dwight's second book The Greatest Race is a collaboration with Sir Stirling Moss and is the true story of his epic and record-crushing drive of the 1955 Mille Miglia in the Mercedes Benz 300 SLR. It's considered one of the greatest racing achievements in history, and it makes for an exciting story.

His third book The Small Silver Speedster features a Porsche 356 Speedster. It's a Father/Daughter story for ALL kids – boys and girls alike. It's a racing story with a cameo by the late, great Denise McCluggage, and featuring the iconic New York dealership of foundational Porsche figure Max Hoffman."

Dwight has just announced book number four at The Petersen Museum's 70th Anniversary celebration of Porsche's first victory at Le Mans. That book "Destined for Victory: The Birth of Porsche and the Story of the First International Win" is to be released in a special 70th Anniversary Edition on December 1st of this year.

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## A **FAMILY** AFFAIR

The Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix has always been a family event. Back in the early 80's the Corvette Club of Western Pennsylvania (CCWP) did quite a bit of autocrossing events. Not many realize that longtime volunteer leaders Danny Yanda and Cathy Dernorsek were part of that group along with John Walko Jr. Danny Yanda did most of the work in his home garage on a Corvette that he and John Walko Jr. built as a track car. That 'Vette prompted a 14-year-old John (Johnnie) Walko III to take an interest in the mechanics of racing.

In 1983, Danny Yanda recruited many of the local Corvette club members to respond to an ad requesting volunteers to the Grand Prix. For the 1984 race, CCWP provided the crowd control personnel to the fledgling Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix, convincing the City Department of Public Safety not to cancel the event in its 2nd year. The Walko's where part of that group, with John Walko Jr. as the president of the PVGP organization for many years, coming up with ideas such as the Walnut Street Car Show.

In 1993, Corvette was for the first time, named Marque of the Year. At that time, John was running the original Corvette, after making some changes to the set-up, eventually winning a national autocross event. Son Johnnie began driving in the SCCA Club Formula Ford class and in 1995 won the Season championship starting from last on the grid. In April 1997, he started John Walko Racing.

Kate Gundlach started working with John III in 2004 and became the right hand of the team's success until 2009. "I grew up with motorcycle racing," Gundlach said. "I've been around it longer than I can remember. I fell in love with car racing, though, when I joined the University of Pittsburgh's Formula SAE (Society of Automotive Engineers) team," sparking a future in the sport.

"I wanted to get into auto racing, but I didn't know where to start," she said. "My Dad knew Danny Yanda from his track time at BeaveRun (today's Pittsburgh International Race Complex). He introduced me to Danny who gave me Johnnie Walko's card, I took it straight back to my dorm room and gave him a call".

"I had her start the next day," said John III, "We were in growth mode at that point, running three F2000 cars, two Formula Enterprise cars, a club program with Formula Continental and a Formula Ford, and a two-car Pro Mazda effort. It was a lot of balls in the air and she kept it running. People in motorsport are hard to find like that. It's not a regular job. You are constantly working to a deadline. It's never, 'We're not going to make that race'. It takes a special person. Kate is all of that."

"Kate was always a very sharp young lady. We hired her at Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing for a few years and now we compete against her, but that's always the

case with racing" said Bobby Rahal, who was the PVGP Honorary Race Director in 1999.

In 2018, Kate, along with Danielle Shepherd, became the first women to win an Indycar Series championship from the engineering stand, working with Scott Dixon from Chip Ganassi Racing. Now, entering her second year with Arrow McLaren SP as a Performance Engineer, Gundlach is continuing her success with driver Pato O'Ward. She is completing against her old teammate Scott Dixon and Alex Palou both at Chip Ganassi Racing. Pato and Alex are in close competition for the points leader in the Indycar series as we go to print, with her former teammate from John Walko Racing, Graham Rahal, not too far behind in the points.

In September 2005, driving for Walko, at the Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course during the first day of racing at the 2005 SCCA National Championship Runoffs, then rookie Graham Rahal, set a new race lap record and took top honors in Formula Atlantic - exactly 30 years after his father, Bobby, won the Formula B Championship in 1975. And that began his rise up the ladder to Indy Cars. "Graham still holds the overall track record for the Pitt Race North Track," commented Walko.

What started with Corvette and an ad in the paper asking for volunteers led Johnnie Walko III to a career in racing which in turn has had on impact on the careers of Kate Gundlach and Graham Rahal and Indy Car history. In 2021 we bring many of those same elements together. Take a look around. Do you see the glint in some teenager's eye admiring the cars? We could be writing about them in 20 or 30 years.





## A WIN-WIN

This will be my sixth year covering the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix as a photographer, and I couldn't think of a better way to use my talents to help raise funds for worthwhile charities. I've always been a car guy, and after Steve Weber (the enthusiastic media director for the event) talked me into coming out and seeing the event in 2015, It's been a high point of my calendar every year. The idea of a car show with a race running through the middle of it, all put on as a part of a fundraiser, you just can't lose there. Unfortunately, Steve passed away in 2017, but Susan Gera, her husband Bubba, and the rest of the media team have continued Steve's enthusiasm through today.

After checking in with Susan at the media center, my day usually starts around the paddock and start/finish area. This is where you can see the cars being prepped for the race event. In the paddock, you'll see mechanics (who are sometimes the drivers themselves) working on their final set ups, making repairs, or chatting with friends and family. The camaraderie is palpable - really laid back. The race teams are mostly an inter-





woven family - I've always gotten great feedback from the teams, the drivers, and their supporters, be it information, water, posing for pictures, what have you. I've seen competitors from different teams come together to repair cars to keep the field as full as possible. Some teams come back year after year, some come in just for one event. All are welcome. It's a really casual vibe that I just haven't gotten covering any other event.



From the paddock, the cars line up along the false grid before making their way onto the track. You can catch some of the on-track action at start/finish and turn one from here as well. After checking in with the corner workers, I'll get some shots from turn one. I've found every corner worker I've come across at this event to be professional and friendly - offering tips on vantage points and reminding me about sunscreen and water, while looking out for everyone's safety.



Just before lunchtime, I'll head over to the hairpin area - turns 18 and 19. This is the spot where I get some of the more iconic shots of the weekend's racing events - there's a distinctive stone wall along both sides of two low-speed, back-to-back hairpin corners, each marked with a large tree at each switchback. It's very distinctive.

After lunch, I'll work my way through the car show, set on the Bob O'Connor Golf Course. Picture a cross between your local "cars and coffee" meetup with an Amelia Island or Pebble Beach "Concours Délegance" event. Participants run the gamut from "mom and pop" project cars to pristine historics, with car club and manufacturer displays scattered along the course, as well as a section for motorcycles. I could get lost here all weekend. Conveniently, turns 13 through 18 from the racetrack run alongside the car show, so it's easy to switch back and forth between the two.



My day usually winds up on the west end of the track. I try to get long, head-on and panning shots of the cars as they come towards the turns at 9 and 13, and along Panther Hollow Bridge as they run past Phipps Conservatory. There aren't usually as many fans out here, probably because it's the farthest away from the car show, but this is one of the highest speed sections of the track.



It is a long day, and I easily get my 10,000 steps in, but it's well worth it. It ticks all the "car guy" and photographer boxes for me, and it gives me some nice shots of the weekend that can be used by the organization for future promotion of the event. Knowing that my contributions to it are all part of a fundraiser, well, that's the very definition of a win-win for me. I hope you find the weekend to be as enjoyable as I do.



## JULY 24 & 25

The only vintage street race in the country



For most of the year, and all of 2020, Schenley Park could be described as green and serene. Walkers and joggers come by on the trails; family's picnic; golfers drive and putt; bicyclists pedal their way around the circuit roads. But then, something strange happens here one weekend in July. The rolling hills and winding roads are transformed into the nation's most challenging racing circuit.

No racing venue in the country - not a permanent road course, not a temporary street circuit -- presents its competitors with as daunting a lap. The course is lined with curbs, ready to flatten tires or damage a suspension. Its stone walls are notorious threats to the fragile vintage bodywork. The pavement is a public road the rest of the year, and public roads are crowned - higher in the middle - to allow rain runoff. But those

crowns tend to throw a speeding car wide off the outside of a turn. Racer Manley Ford says that, because of those crowns, ". . . for the most part, the track is only half as wide as it looks." Run off the road here, and you might meet one of the park's mature and beautiful trees, along with the aforementioned curbs and walls.

On entering the park or the adjacent golf course, you may hear the race cars in the background, revving their engines in warm up or tuning, or you may hear the passing of a group of cars on the track. These are sounds that excite your soul and alert you to the seriousness of the racing. Many a newcomer has remarked, "You mean to tell me that they are actually racing?" Yes! And with 22 turns and 17 elevation changes, the track is quite challenging and unforgiving to novice and experienced drivers with more than a few accidental smashups or spinouts over the years. If you know anything about racing history these sights and sounds evoke






a mind picture of what it must have been like at Watkins Glen, Monte Carlo or the Italian Mille Miglia where crowds stand beside the road as the cars roar past.

Yet, around the golf course are thousands of specialty automobiles, brought here by loving owners to the delight of aficionados and casual spectators alike. There is paint and chrome and wood and upholstery fashioned into vehicles that were once new and now perhaps museum quality.

But the real excitement is in the racing, it is the heart of this event. You are encouraged to find a spot to watch the cars speed past, root for an underdog or applaud a leader, it is racing not seen anywhere else and it belongs to Pittsburgh.

You are encouraged to venture around the park, cheer on the racers, talk to owners and enthusiasts who have a love of all things automotive and enjoy one of the nation's best automobile experiences...knowing that it is as unique as we say it is. And if you happen to see a driver, a show car owner, or a volunteer, please thank them because without them, this one-of-a-kind event would never happen.







# A LAP OF SCHENLEY PARK

It is a rare moment, a drop in the bucket of time, a flash-back to the halcyon past of legends and a brief, brilliant chance to taste an experience that, for the most part, no longer exists. Come along for a lap through Schenley Park one of the few remaining street courses open to the grass roots racer.

Leaving the gratefully shaded false grid in an explosion of vintage cacophony, a symphony of ancient iron, your peripheral vision catches the brilliant pallet of spectators lining the roadway, reduced to brief swatches of color as you accelerate by.

As you leave the false grid the long, wide, uphill straight lulls you into a "piece of cake" sense combined with a post-pubescent pursuit of the risky—yes it's a street—there's a speed limit sign and double yellow lines you cross with impunity and glee. Cresting the hill toward the end of the straight you encounter the tight, second (maybe even first) gear hay bale created chicane and poo-poo the whole "nanny-ness" of it all.

Powering out of the chicane you straighten out the lazy two lane zig-zag onto the bridge. Off its high concrete walls lies a valley you noted on the track walk,

What lies ahead is not the smooth expanse of a race track but the grooved, striped, crowned, occasionally bumpy, crumbling and multi-laned surface of an urban street. Curbs, some visible, some lurking under tufts of overgrown grass, line every inch of the park lane, a leisurely path, curving lazily through verdant woods, a relaxing drive for three hundred and sixty three days a year. But for two days a year it sprouts hay bales, saw horses and nearly two dozen corner stations as it morphs into a race course calling up memories of the original Watkins Glen or Elkhart Lake where the legends of your youth slung over-powered under-tired machines with temperamental and woefully inadequate brakes down streets designed for much tamer traffic. This is the annual Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix in Schenley Park.

a roll cage might not be much help against the momentum gained in that four story drop. On the bridge, though, your only thought is setting up for the closest version to a high speed sweeper on the course. A third of the way through that fast right hander you do your best to manage the colony of bumps and pavement patches as your car jitters across them—a super stiff suspension is not your friend here—takes a set, then heads, full throttle, into the wide, fairly flat final bit of the turn, suppressing the urge to giggle as you sweep right through the stop sign on the corner, foot mashed to the floor, heading toward the forest.

So far the course has been four lanes wide and fairly flat, camber not being much of an issue, but an acute, second gear uphill right hander shoots you into the more intimidating part of the lap as the pavement, cosseted by trees, slims to a claustrophobic, heavily crowned and narrow winding two lane course uphill toward a two foot high roughhewn sandstone wall mottled in a decades old coating of lichen.

Beyond that stunted barrier are the tops of old growth trees. You don't really see them as you hug the inside of the long curving left hand bend, where the camber and pitch is in your favor. As your car takes a set it's very tempting to tip the accelerator but two thirds of the way across the pavement the cambers drops abruptly off into curbing and that stone wall a couple feet past that. Would the wall keep you from flipping down to the base of those trees or just provide a bit of trajectory? Maybe it's best not to tempt it.

After modulating the gas and steering wheel around the sweep that alternately widens, subtly tightens, then widens again and seems to go on forever, you pop out into the sunlight and a sea of green hills blanketed in race fans. The road weaves back and forth among ancient, and very sturdy old trees each sporting a single hay bale, the dappled old stone wall reappears on your right and what the organizers refer to as "the serpentine" arrives. The right left combo, essentially a pair of U-turns, is so tight your HANS device allows you to just glimpse the apexes with your peripheral vision and as you complete the final left U-turn you can see corner

workers literally a few feet away through your driver's window. The road again unwinds and heads downhill. After the agonizingly slow serpentine section you upshift and go to full throttle for the lazy S ahead—but take care, this corner has eaten a lot of competitors as the road dips (decreased traction you know) away to the left and your car wants to drift to the very off camber right side of the road. Keeping things under control you swing right down the short start-finish line stretch, slight touch of the brakes before the very fast bear right (through a blinking traffic signal), drift left but not so much as to clip the temporary Jersey barrier at the end the turn's track out and back onto the straight that began this whole 22 turn, 2.1 mile urban road course.

Driving Schenley Park, aside from being an incredible and rare experience, provides a real, visceral sense for what road racing was like in its earliest days. In the park the organizers and racers say the same thing; this is a unique opportunity to be part of a yearly celebration of racing's heritage, best experienced at a seven tenths pace. But it also gives you an insight into the talent, courage and, yes, luck, it took to survive and excel in a sport that often turned deadly when the driving ratcheted to ten tenths, an unforgettable drop in time.

## LEGENDS OF SCHENLEY PARK

# A dream born of the pursuit of racing and altruism

This tract of land in the heart of Pittsburgh becomes a bridge to a time when legends lived. It is a car lover's dream: a Xanadu for vintage racers, the pursuit of happiness, a new chapter in "The Last Open Road", a road course in the grand style. Now after 38 years it is also the site for the recognition of The Legends of Schenley Park- an elite group of racing legends who have competed here for 15 or more years.

These legends grew from humble beginnings, from altruistic goals and encounters, not just a fleeting victory. There are the usual lurking beasts to conquer at 'The Serpentine' and 'Panther Hollow', to moments of

self-doubt and podium finishes, spirited competition and camaraderie. There are hundreds of drivers, a thousand volunteers and a groundswell of enthusiasm from spectators and sponsors, who return year after year.

Before there could be legends there had to be a track; so the stories of drivers are intertwined with the moment of inception, this time not in the shadow of Camelot or Sherwood forest, but, as it has been told, in a restaurant on Walnut street. Imagine a night of revelry back in 1982 where a small cadre of local race fans first brought up the pipe dream of racing on city streets. This lighthearted idea brings them together again, this time in Alan Patterson's race garage in Shadyside. There, with broad strokes, a 'one-time, little event in the park' is laid out.

The plan was simple; to put together a friendly race on city streets, have fun and funnel all proceeds to charity. The loosely-knit group took on Herculean tasks of logistics and politics. Park services had to be convinced that the plan was feasible and the venue safe. Mayor Richard Caliguiri was approached and endorsed the plan after it was made clear that a race would benefit charity. Spectators would flock to the idyllic grounds of Schenley Park to view the cars over Labor Day in 1983.

Then a "call to arms" was sent out. Like clans banding together, volunteers from the Sports Car Club of America and the Vintage Sports Car Club of America gathered. Flagging, timing, scoring, and communications were just some of the duties involved. Less specialized volunteers also toiled at parking, directing traffic and basic clean-up to put on the first Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix.

In 2019 we inducted Darren Mann and Nate Scigliano into the club. We will recognize the newest Legends, Joe Parlanti and Peter Patterson on Friday, July 23 at the Drivers Reception in the Schenley Park Cafe.

### **GOLF CARTS**

Only PVGP volunteers and sponsors/car clubs are permitted to use golf carts. The Golf Course does not own golf carts; the PVGP contracts to bring them in to help run the event. They are not available for rent and cannot be borrowed. You are not permitted to bring your own golf cart or powered cart onto the golf course for liability reasons unless approved by PVGP.

#### HANDICAP PARKING & ACCESSIBILITY

While the Grand Prix does benefit handicapped individuals, unfortunately there is very little handicap parking available within close proximity to the races and car shows. Your best option is to park on Flagstaff Hill for \$25 and take the free handicap shuttle to the golf course. The Vietnam Pavilion along the Boulevard of the Allies provides a great view of the golf course and it is handicap accessible with free parking. There is no shuttle bus service to and from the Vietnam Pavilion.

### TICKETS FOR THE GRAND PRIX

Race Weekend at Schenley Park is \$5 for spectators, 13 and over. There is a \$50 donation for those who wish to display their car in the International Car Show at Schenley Park for the weekend. All vendors and sponsors must be registered with the PVGP ahead of time.

### **TENTS**

Tents are only permitted if you are an official sponsor, a paying vendor or a participating car club. Tents must be secured through the PVGP. The Grand Prix rents the golf course for the weekend and has the final approval of any tents or display structures on the property. Spectators are not permitted to bring pop-up tents or beach umbrellas as they block spectator views and can become a safety hazard in windy conditions. This is a charity event run by dedicated volunteers - please cooperate with them.

#### SPONSORS AND VENDORS

Organizations and individuals must be official sponsors or vendors of the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix in order to display, market, sell or solicit with Schenley Park or any event venue. Our event benefits charity - please obey our rules and do your part to help our charities. Violators will be removed and possibly prosecuted.

### **VOLUNTEERS**

Our volunteers generously give of their time to run the event. You can easily identify them by their green volunteer t-shirts – please follow their directions and show them the proper respect. We are always looking for new volunteers. It takes over 1,200 people to stage the event, so please call Cathy Dernorsek at 412 824-2297 if you want to get involved.

#### **SEVERE WEATHER**

There is no rain date for any of our events. Because of the time constraints and street closures we are unable to reschedule events and we try our best to hold all events if weather permits. If wet conditions are severe on the Schenley Park golf course, the superintendent has the right to close the course to vehicle traffic arriving and leaving. We ask that you be patient and follow the instructions of the PVGP staff.


### **SCHENLEY PARK GUEST GUIDELINES**

#### What spectators CAN bring:

Cameras, coolers, picnic baskets, ponchos, blankets, folding chairs and baby strollers.

### What spectators CAN NOT bring:

Spectators are **not permitted** to bring pop-up tents (this includes canopies, EZ-Ups or camping tents) or beach umbrellas. These are not permitted as they block views and can become a hazard in windy conditions. Cooking grills of any kind are not permitted unless you are an approved caterer for a sponsor or car club. Only PVGP approved golf carts are allowed on the premises - spectators are not permitted to bring a personal or rented golf carts. Bicycles are **not permitted** by the Schenley Park Golf Course because of the damage caused on fairways. Frisbees and footballs or soccer balls are also not permitted because of the risk to spectators and show cars. Absolutely no weapons or fireworks are allowed.



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



## PITTSBURGH TRANSPORTATION GROUP-FREE SHUTTLE BUSES

To help shuttle the spectators on Race Weekend we work closely with the experts at Pittsburgh Transportation Group to shuttle attendees throughout the park.


The shuttle system originates at Flagstaff Hill where public parking is available for \$25 per day. Up to 5 passengers will get a free wristband that gets you into the event. Free shuttles transport guests up to the golf course making a stop midway up Schenley Drive at the European Car Show. If you are headed to the Start/Finish area at the end of Beacon Street, several of the buses will take you there directly.

### Handicap Parking

The Vietnam Pavilion is a popular vantage point for our handicapped spectators and they can drive there directly and park beside the pavilion. Because of road closures we no longer run the outer loop bus to the Vietnam Pavilion.

For the July 24/25 weekend we run 7 full time shuttles between 9:00 AM and 6:00 PM. These shuttle buses are provided for free, so please have patience if you are riding during the peak hours of our event.





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## 17TH ANNUAL PVGP HISTORICS AT PITT-RACE COMPLEX

The Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix has had two weekends of racing since 2004. The little brother, known as the PVGP Historics, is now 17 years old and more than ready to stand beside his much older brother, Schenley.

Back to the beginning, in 2003 PVGP Race Director Mike Connolly thought the PVGP should race at the new track in Beaver County called BeaveRun. The dedicated track would allow race cars to compete that were too big and powerful for the Schenley Park course. He conferred with his Assistant Race Directors and then turned to old friend and vintage racer Ralph Steinberg who was part of a group forming a new vintage race organization called Vintage Racer Group (VRG) where it would be a good fit for both parties.

### CANDY'S RIDES

At lunchtime on the weekend spectators have an opportunity to experience a lap of the track in a real race car. Named in honor of Candy Stephani, who passed away in 2011, a longtime volunteer and wife of racer Ralph Steinberg. For just a \$25 donation you can experience a lap of the entire 2.8 mile circuit, and for \$60 you can secure a seat for a thrilling ride in a Shelby Cobra or a GT40!



### **KARTING**

These are not your father's go-karts! No, these machines reach speeds of 45 MPH, and the wheel-to-wheel action will have you coming back for more. You can participate individually or bring a group of friends and compete. You must be at least 12 years old and able to reach the pedals. PIRC will donate a percentage of the rentals to the Grand Prix charities. The kart, gas, helmet and all safety equipment are included. The track is also available for private parties or groups all day Friday and before 11:00 AM on the weekend.



### VIP PARKING

The track expansion three years ago opened up 2 acres of prime viewing area at the confluence of the North and South Tracks. This plateau is the home for VIP Parking. For a flat fee of \$20 each day you can park on top of the hill with a view of the new south track and picnic trackside all day. For only \$10 per day you can park under the Water Tower in the grass with a great view of the final turn.







With a total area of six acres, the neighboring skid pad provides ample room for specialized training in an assortment of performance and evasive driving maneuvers.

2021 will also see the grand opening of the new Headquarters building, which broke ground in 2020



and will house the administration offices, all full-time employees, a new retail store and more restrooms to serve guests.

The Stout's dedication and investment in the facility are a tribute to their focus on customer service. "Last year obviously presented many challenges for Pitt Race, but also several opportunities," said Stout. "We continued our plan of improvements, with a focus on more outdoor recreational events for our community and customers and adding amenities for the comfort and enjoyment of anyone attending our facility. 








# INTERNATIONAL CAR SHOW AT SCHENLEY PARK



There are few auto races that also provide the diversion of a car show. At the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix in Schenley Park, we don't offer a few cars, we give you nearly 3,000 of them - from all margues, on the golf course overlooking the races. And some are museum pieces from around the world.

Bill Roberts proposed the idea of an invitational affair in 1984 when a small but magnificent display assembled at the Frick Fine Arts Museum in Oakland. The show grew in 1985, with cars being shown on Flagstaff Hill and with the addition of Marque of the Year. Larry Smith stepped in to take us to the next level -presenting the cars on the Schenley Park golf course. Today,

The International Car Show at Schenley Park is arranged by geographic region of manufacture. The show is open to any type of car and all car clubs are welcome. Toward the bottom of Schenley Drive, you will find German Hill, featuring the car clubs for Porsche, BMW, Mercedes-Benz, Volkswagen and MINI

British Car Day, hosted by WPTA on Saturday, sits at the top of the course and features Triumph, Aston Martin, MG, Austin-Healey, Jaguar, Rolls Royce, Lotus, Morgan and Land Rover.

The Asian display along Schenley Drive includes, Subaru, Nissan, Mazda, Honda, Toyota and Mitsubishi to name a few.

The American Car Show is on the clubhouse side of Schenley Drive and is an excellent representation of classic and modern-day cars. All brands are represented with a large presence from Ford, Chevrolet, Pontiac, Mercury, Buick, Chrysler, Plymouth, Dodge and Packard. Corvette is the honored Marque this year, so they move across the street to the featured fairway - hole number three for the golfers out there.

On the 18th fairway beside the Pittsburgh Golf Club, you will find the Italian Cortile featuring Ferrari, Fiat, Lamborghini, Maserati and Alfa Romeo. Lancia has been selected as the featured 2021 Proiettore Macchina. Starting this year, the Cortile welcomes Citroen and



all French manufacturers' cars including Alpine, Bugatti, Citroën, Peugeot and Renault are invited, to not only showcase their cars on the Cortile Showfield but also to join them in lunch and all of the other private festivities at the Cortile.

Pittsburgh Cars 'N' Coffee will display near the clubhouse showcasing over 50 exotic cars. Cliff Laschon and his team keep upping the quality and variety of this "must see show". and the Pittsburgh Car Scene and TrueForm Car Club are banding together for a show in the area where the Corvettes usually display by the clubhouse.

We're not limited to just automobiles as we now have a vintage motorbike display on the golf course at the corner of Darlington Road and East Circuit Drive. Ton-Up Pittsburgh is returning to manage the Motorbike Show that gets better each year.

# CORVETTES ATTHEVINTAGE

Corvette is the Featured Marque for the 2021 running of the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix. We are excited to feature the much heralded Mid-engine C8 Corvette which made its debut as a 2020 model. You should be aware that the development of the C8 was driven by Corvette engineering upon determining that the C7 Corvette was near the performance limit for front engine, rear-wheel drive designs. In spite of all the hype around the C8's introduction, and with the past 18 months of covid-19 restrictions, this year's PVGP will be one of the first large venues to feature the new Mid-engine C8. We look forward to being part of this outstanding celebration of the automobile.

1983 saw the inaugural event of the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix Association. It was also the year that NO Corvettes were sold to the public. Due to production/design problems developing the C4 platform, there would not be a 30th Anniversary celebration for America's Sports Car.

During Corvette's 40th Anniversary ten years later, however, Corvette was chosen to be the 1993 PVGP



featured Marque. Special guests that year were true Corvette Royalty. They included Zora Duntov, the Chief Engineer that pushed the performance and racing aspect of the Corvette brand, his wife Elfie, and Larry Shinoda, the Chief designer of the mid -60's Corvette Stingray series, now often referred to as the C-2. That year also featured Phil Hill as the Honorary Race Director, the first American to become the Grand Prix World Driving Champion. This was the only time these famous

automobile celebrities ever had a chance to visit and socialize with each other. Each one left the event impressed with the PVGP organization, the Schenley Park venue, the City of Pittsburgh itself, and especially the hospitality afforded them by all the people they met.

Another unique Marque activity that year was a "Corvette exhibition race" of a dozen or so specially prepared Vettes. These included two 1963 Grand Sport replicas, and the 1967 Sunray DX L-88 racecar that Finished 1st in class, and 10th overall at LeMans that year. It was driven in the Schenley "exhibition race" by Dr. Dick Thompson, the most famous Corvette race driver through that era. Chip Miller, of Carlisle Productions, also participated with his Corvette Challenge car that he drove in from Carlisle. The roar of the Corvette V-8 engines was a stark contrast to the high revving sounds of the smaller race engines typically heard on Grand Prix weekend. It remains a great memory for all the race fans that got to watch that spirited "exhibition". It is considered by many as being one of the most exciting races ever held in Schenley Park.

As special Corvette display was created with the help of local Corvette clubs that included one of every model Corvette from every year. It was an impressive display of over 200 cars that caused Mr. Duntov to exclaim that he had "never, ever seen this before!" The last one needed to complete the display, a rare 1955 model, was located just before start of the event. To everyone's surprise, it was found literally in the Schenley Park neighborhood. This should not surprise anyone, as Pittsburgh's neigh-

borhoods and surrounding suburbs are filled with car enthusiasts, with a very wide range of interests. Thankfully, Corvette people are part of this group. It is not widely known, but the Western PA area is home to at least 13 different Corvette Clubs.

We must also mention that the Pittsburgh area contributed greatly to the Corvette's early racing development



and successes. Don Yenko started racing in his new '57 Vette, had some fun, and was hooked by the racing bug. It didn't hurt that his father owned a Chevy dealership in nearby Canonsburg. The following year Don helped start the Corvette Club of Western PA as a club for fellow racing enthusiasts, the first such Club in PA. Donna Mae Mims, along with her husband Mike Mims, helped get the Club rolling. She proved to be the better driver, and she stayed with it. A year or so later, Donna Mae brought Grady Davis to the Club, where he hit it off with





Yenko. Davis was the Executive VP of Research for the Gulf Oil Company headquartered in Pittsburgh. Within a year, the first corporate sponsored auto racing team in Motorsports history showed up as the Yenko/Gulf Corvette Racing Team. The team featured new 1961 fuel injected white Corvettes with blue racing stripes and Gulf badging. A Production and B Production SCCA National championships were garnered for the next three years.

The first of six Corvette Grand Sports came through the Gulf racing program. With Dr. Dick Thompson driving, the 'lightweight" won 12 out of 14 races it entered in '63, including the A Production Championship. Yenko, Davis, Mims, and Thompson all had successful driving careers, and all four have been inducted into the Corvette Museum Hall of Fame. In addition, Donna Mae be-

came the first female SCCA National Driving Champion as part of the Yenko program, albeit not in a Corvette. Other notable local Corvette race drivers included Ed Lowther, Al Forsyth, Ed Myers, and Bob Johnson running with Yenko out of Ohio.

It is fair to state that the Pittsburgh contribution to the early Corvette racing efforts was rather substantial, establishing a standard that continues with the current C8-R program. It was none other than Carroll Shelby who actually put in writing that the Gulf Corvette Racing program elevated racing standards across the country, a trait carried on by Corvette racing to this day. When we see the C8-R doing well, remember their program has its roots here in Pittsburgh. Let's make this July full of more fun-fill Corvette memories.

The Macchina of Lancia have been selected as our 2021 Proiettore Macchina! Lancia is renowned in the automotive world for landmark innovations. In 1913 the Theta was the first production car to feature a complete electrical system as standard equipment. In 1922 Lancia introduced the Lambda: the first car with a monocoque chassis and an independent front suspension.

In the World Rally Championship, Lancia remains the most statistically successful marque, winning constructors' titles with the Fulvia in 1972, the Stratos in 1974, 1975 and 1976, the 037 in 1983 and the Delta 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991 and 1992! The Lancia Delta is the most successful individual model designation ever to compete in rallying. All this gave Lancia a total of 11 Championships over the years.

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
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# A CAPTURED MOMENT INTIME

They say that a picture is a captured moment in time. Recorded history, if you will. If so, the poster for the PVGP Historics race weekend at Pittsburgh International Race Complex is just that, a recorded history of when Chevrolet had planned to best the Shelby Cobra. The two would compete to be the racing machine of unparalleled performance.

According to Rick Tavel, a writer and organizer of Corvette events, and consulting for his company R/T Corvette Consultants, with the new Corvette came the hopes that Corvette would continue to dominate the race tracks, even with the threat of the much publicized "new gun" in town, the Shelby Cobra. The first showdown between the new C2 and the Cobra took place in Riverside, on October 13, 1962.

Chevrolet, also aware of the threat that the Cobra posed, offered the first four Corvette Z06s to well-known racers, Dave MacDonald, Bob Bondurant, Jerry Grant, and Doug Hooper in hopes of continuing their dominance.

## CJ Titterington's 1963 Corvette Z06

The race was getting national attention and the engineers of both contenders were not going to miss the battle. Zora Arkus-Duntov and Carroll Shelby were both on hand. The Corvette driven by Dave MacDonald and the Shelby Cobra driven by Billy Krause battled for the lead most of the race until the Cobra retired due to rear suspension problems. This left the lead solely to MacDonald who was way out in front until he shredded a rear tire and damaged the suspension too badly to continue. Doug Hopper in the Mickey Thompson sponsored Corvette went on to win the race.

The victory was great news for Chevrolet and word spread quickly across the country and racers rushed to order their Z06s. But production problems in the fall of 1962 prevented all but the first specially assigned 15 cars to be delivered in 1962, even though several were ordered almost immediately after the Riverside race.

This brings us back to the car captured on our poster. It is an actual car that has been viewed and heard many times at Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix events over the years and has historic proportions.

Alvin Forsythe, owner of Forsythe Chevrolet in Homestead, PA, a steel mill suburb of Pittsburgh, ordered the Z06 to race on tracks in the East. The car was built and delivered in late February. Forsyth's car was delivered in Tuxedo Black with black interior, a rare choice for the race equipped 1963 Z06 which came with the big 36-gallon tank and radio delete. He campaigned it in full racing form through 1969 with some success. He had several podium finishes in local races and in the top ten of most regional races, even finishing third in the 1964 Watkins Glen 500. It was eventually purchased by Dan Ferri of Murrysville, PA who successfully raced the car in competition, winning his last two races at Nelson Ledges in 1975. Finally ac-

quired in poor shape in 1976 by CJ Titterington, a 19-year-old local car enthusiast from Pittsburgh. CJ restored the car first by making it street worthy. Then a chance encounter several years later with a Corvette Z06 historian, created a desire to return his 1963 Corvette C2 Z06 Tanker to its as-raced historic original specifications. Its as close to a perfect example of an original Z06 in race form as can be found.

"The fact that Titterington's Z06 is not a "BarnFind" in no

way diminishes the interesting story of the car and its builder, its extensive race history through CJ's purchase of a used up race car in 1976and his long, often painstaking restoration of the car."

"The other part of the story is the fact that CJ has ended up with a historically significant concours quality 1963 race Z06 that he personally built and restored over the years, a piece at a time. It is a story about the hundreds, if not thousands of hours. Titterington, with some help from his three sons Charles, Jesse, and Justin, and his good friend Dave Ley put into the restoration. It's about the detailed fabrication of missing, or unobtainable parts by CJ, an iron worker by trade, to exact GM design specs. It's about the extensive research and contacts made along the way, unearthing the history and specifications of the car. Its about following the recommendations and guidance of one of the most knowledgeable experts on racing Z06s in the world, Franz Estereicher. It's a story about keeping your eye on the prize and a commitment to excellence. It is the stuff that dreams are made of and refutes the belief that cars, like CJ's, are out of reach for the common man. What it is not is a story about having hundreds of thousands of dollars to pay someone else to do a world class restoration. Simply, it's a story about a man and his car, his vision, his plan and his commitment to make the car live again."

CJ and his sons will have the Z06 at just about every event during this July's PVGP Race Week. Be sure to stop by to learn more about this historic car and meet it's unique owner. Be sure to bring your camera, so that you may capture your own moment in time.










# PHPPS CONSERVATORY AND BOTANICAL GARDENS

No, you haven't just timetraveled to the Victorian era - you've spotted the region's well-preserved glasshouse jewel! This is Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens, Pittsburgh's home for incredible flower displays for the past 128 years. Phipps' celebrat-

ed horticultural display and education programs have secured its place as an internationally recognized top garden experience.


As one of the few remaining glasshouse conservatories in the U.S. still producing full-scale seasonal flower shows year-round, Phipps combines world-class displays, designs, education courses and programs to inspire a deeper understanding and appreciation of nature in hundreds of thousands of guests each year. Counted among its most popular shows in recent memory are its conservatory-wide collaborations with renowned glass artists Dale Chihuly, Hans Godo Frabel and Jason Gamrath, all of whom still have work on permanent view in the Conservatory; the blockbuster Summer Flower Show: Van Gogh in Bloom, in which Phipps' expert design team receated the painter's works in immersive plantscapes; and the dazzling Winter Flower Show and Light Garden, which has become an annual tradition for over 100,000 visitors each year.



This summer, Phipps presents a show unlike anything the glasshouse has displayed before. Summer Flower Show: The Hidden Life of Trolls features one-of-a-kind displays of trolls inspired by the mythological creatures found in folklore and pop culture. Enhanced by interactive features, cutting-edge animatronics and thousands of colorful summer plants and flowers, this magical exhibit is sure to delight children and adults alike. Tickets must be purchased in advance and are available now at phipps. conservatory.org.

Recent years have brought cutting-edge, high-performance buildings to the Phipps campus to complement its historic glasshouse. These efforts have reached new levels of excellence with the Center for Sustainable Landscapes (2012), which is the only building in the world to achieve five of the highest certifications for green construction.

From the introduction of sustainable horticulture protocols and integrated pest management to the elimination of bottled water and use of fresh Conservatory-grown vegetables in its café, Phipps has deployed dozens of practices and initiatives as part of its holistic approach and mission. Moving beyond the glass walls of its campus, Phipps has also become a community leader through programs like Homegrown, which installs raised bed vegetable gardens in underserved neighborhoods; Studio Phipps, a design consultation and education service which works with local hospitals and other commercial properties to add sustainable and beautiful green spaces; and Let's Move Pittsburgh, an initiative dedicated to promoting healthy eating and physical activity to its region's children.






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# VINTAGE INDY CARS to Run in the Park!

This past Memorial Day weekend saw the running of 105th edition of what's come to be known as "The Greatest Spectacle in Racing" - the Indianapolis 500. From Ray Harroun's victory in a Marmon Wasp in 1911, through the amazing comeback win by Helio Castroneves this year, Indy has given fans some of the greatest races, cars, and drivers in history.

That history comes alive in Schenley Park this weekend as the PVGP welcomes the Vintage Indy Registry. Dedicated to the history and preservation of Indianapolis Championship Cars through the year 2001, Vintage Indy selects just a short list of events to visit each year. This year for the first time, the group has brought to Schenley Park about 15 cars from a broad range of Indy history. Here's a look at just a few of them.

The oldest of the bunch is a 1932 Miller/Ford, using the Ford Model B motor modified by legendary race car designer and builder Harry Miller. The car carries the logo of the long-lost Brightwood Airport in downtown Indianapolis.



A number of our cars were raced at Indy in the 1960s, and include an Offenhauser-engined Watson driven in the 1963 race by Indy winner Jim Rathmann, and the extremely rare and highly valuable Lotus 56 STP turbine, nicknamed the "Doorstop," in which Joe Leonard won the pole and nearly the race in 1968. A fuel pump failure took that car out, but it showed such speed that the U.S. Auto Club, which sanctioned the race at the time, changed the rules essentially to outlaw it.

Representing the 1970s at Indy, we have the AAR Olsonite Eagle Offy, built by Dan Gurney and qualified on pole by Bobby Unser for the 1972 race. An ignition issue took the car out after just 31 laps. But,





Bobby had won the race four years earlier, and would do so again, 3 years hence, both also in an Eagle Offy.

From the 1980s, we have Roberto Guerrero's True Value/STP March 86C, from 1986. Guerrero qualified 8th in this car and finished 4th. The winner that year was Bobby Rahal, whose very last lap was the fastest ever at Indy up to that date.

Our Vintage Indy group will take to the track for exhibition sessions early both Saturday and Sunday afternoons. Two-time Indianapolis 500 winner Al Unser Jr. will pace the sessions in his Johnny Lightning Specialinspired John Cooper Works Mini.

Best of all, the cars are in a fan-friendly paddock, where you can see them up close, and meet the drivers

and mechanics. There's a lot of history sitting there. You might want to stop by in the morning to see and hear the engine start and warmup procedures. It's a treat for the eyes and ears!

Michael Lashmett, Vintage Indy CEO excitedly stated "the members of the Vintage Indy Registry are honored with the invitation to bring these iconic Indianapolis cars to the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix. We all acknowledge the history of this storied event and look forward to placing these historic cars before the throngs of fans along this scenic street course. A first really - the roar of vintage Indy cars in Schenley Park and all for a wonderful charitable cause. I can't wait to hear the first Offy fire up! This is going to be thrilling for everyone!"

# HONORARY RACE DIRECTOR

# AL UNSER JR.



Al Unser Jr. is appearing at the PVGP Race Weekend in Schenley Park as part of the Vintage Indy Exhibition. He will drive the pace car and will be in the Vintage Indy display all weekend. We are honored that he is coming to Pittsburgh and proud to name him our Honorary Race Director for 2021.

Two-time Indy 500 winner Al Unser, Jr., a member of racing's fastest family, was raised watching his father, Al, Sr., a four-time Indianapolis 500 winner and his Uncle Bobby, a three-time Indy winner. Between them, the Unsers have won the Indianapolis 500 a remarkable nine times.

Known in the racing world as "Little Al" in deference to the career achievements of his legendary father, Al says, "he's taught me everything I know, but he hasn't taught me everything he knows."

In addition to Al's two Indy 500 wins, he is a two-time CART champion (1990, 1994), two-time Rolex 24 Hours of Daytona winner (1986, 1987), and two-time IROC champion (1986, 1988). Al has also competed in NASCAR events, including the Daytona 500.

Al made his CART debut in 1982 and competed full-time in 1983. He recorded his first Series win in 1984 on Father's Day.

The 1985 campaign was a storybook season when he finished second in the Series standings to his father, by one point. In 1990, Al, Jr. was named "Driver of the Year" and became the first second-generation Series champion, behind his father. In 1992 he won his first Indy 500, by history's closest margin of 0.043 seconds, again following in his father's Indywinning footsteps.

In 1994, Al won both the Indy 500 and the Series championship a second time. He was named "1994 Athlete of the Year" by ABC Sports and in the same year received the ESPY Award for Auto Racing Performer of the Year. It was 1994 through the 1999 season that Al, Jr. drove for Team Penske, during which time he compiled one CART Championship, one Indy 500 victory and a total of twelve race wins.









# Western Pennsylvania's Rich Automotive History

From the first gas station to the first jeep, Western Pennsylvania is rich with automotive history and innovations that have changed the world.

That important history is on view at the Senator John Heinz History Center, a Smithsonian-affiliated museum located in Pittsburgh's Strip District. The History Center, which is the largest history museum in the state, has preserved the history and memories of Western Pennsylvanians since 1879.

Auto enthusiasts will enjoy exploring the museum's six floors of exhibition space that features several historic vehicles, including:

# Stainless Steel Sedan

Most cars are worn and torn after a decade of travel, but a shiny Pittsburgh invention cruised the nation for a decade and returned looking brand new. In 1935, Pittsburgh-based steel manufacturer Allegheny Ludlum partnered with the Ford Motor Company to showcase the versatility of stain-



less steel and prove that it was not just a building material. The result was a classic Ford Deluxe Sedan made of the rust-proof "Allegheny Metal." After a year of production, traveling salesmen drove the flashy, silver cars to cities across the U.S., turning heads at every stop light. Envious drivers and even

movie stars wanted a sparkling Deluxe Sedan of their own. Over a 10-year period, each of the six cars logged more than 200,000 miles, yet looked as if they had just rolled off the assembly line. The corrosion-resistant stainless steel eliminated rusting problems experienced with traditional carbon steel cars. Although the weatherproof finish outlasted most of its non-stainless steel components - including the engine, transmission, shock absorbers, and gears - the Allegheny metal could not be coiffed as thin and was not as malleable as carbon steel. Ford plant workers literally "broke the dies" as they stomped out the experimental cans. The stainless steel cars proved too costly for mass production, weighing about 50% more than the other carbon steel cars made for 1936. The experiment helped raise public awareness of stainless steel's many uses - from cookware to surgical instruments and helped to shine the spotlight on this unique Pittsburgh product: the "Allegheny  $\operatorname{Metal}^{\widetilde{"}}$  - stainless steel. One of the remaining stainless steel cars is on view in the History Center's first floor Great Hall.

# The World's First Jeep

Just prior to our nation's participation in World War II, the United States Army was in search of a motorized vehicle that would replace the horse. In 1940, the U.S. Quartermaster General issued a request for proposals to 135 car makers in America. The big car companies laughed off the 49-day deadline for the production of a prototype vehicle that would weigh less than 2,000 pounds, climb a 30-degree grade, pull a cannon, and go anywhere a horse could go. Only one company met the Army's deadline and requirements: the tiny American Bantam Car Company in Butler, PA. After working day and night, the jeep was born - cobbled together with equal measures of spare parts, ingenuity, and "can-do" spirit. Bantam was the only company to meet the Army's deadline and on July 25, 1940, was officially awarded a contract for 70 vehicles. The Bantam Reconnaissance Cars were deployed to military installations across the U.S. for further testing and became known as "jeeps." Though no one knows with certainty where this name comes from, historians have speculated that it derived from "GP," for General Purpose vehicles, while others believe it was named for Eugene the Jeep, a magical creature popularized in Popeye cartoons. Over the next year, Bantam worked hard to produce jeeps. But by 1941, the government feared that little Bantam could not meet wartime production demands and turned to Willys Overland and the Ford Motor Company for nearly 700,000 vehicles. Today,

the jeep is known worldwide as an American original. The the oldest jeep on Planet Earth on long-term loan from the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History, and on view in the History Center's first floor Great Hall.

# Westinghouse Electric Car

While hybrid and electric cars are the wave of the future, their roots go back more than 100 years. During the mid-1800s, inventors first built crude electric-powered carriages. By the early 1900s, electric cars outsold all other types of cars in the U.S. until Henry Ford introduced the mass-produced, gasoline-powered Model T in 1908. Production of electric vehicles declined around 1920 due to the cars' lack of horsepower and the ready availability of gasoline. In 1966, Congress introduced bills recommending the use of electric vehicles as a means of reducing air pollution. One year later, the Westinghouse Electric Corporation manufactured a special electric vehicle intended to be used as a "city friendly" vehicle with a compact size. The 1967 Westinghouse Markette Electric Car featured 12 conventional six-volt lead-acid batteries which allowed the car to drive for 50 miles. Using a built-in battery charger featuring a retractable 12-foot cord that plugged into a standard 110-volt AC outlet, it took about eight hours to fully recharge the batteries. The two-seater car had a 25 miles per hour cruising speed. While the car was innovative, it never made it into production during the "bigger is better" car trend of the 1960s. An original 1967 Westinghouse Markette electric car, owned by former Westinghouse CEO Donald Burnham, is on view at the History Center as part of the Visible Storage Gallery.


