Autism-Pittsburgh addresses the needs of individuals with autism in 14 counties in Western Pennsylvania through a comprehensive array of information, advocacy and referral services, provided to their families and the caring professionals and service providers who work with them. This includes creating, developing and improving programs and approaches in diagnosis, treatment, education, training and social adjustment.

Autism is a neurological disorder that impairs behavior and communication; often tragically. More than 42,000 families in Western Pennsylvania have individuals with this disability-over 18,000 alone in Allegheny County. The CDC indicated a national rate of 1 in 44 births are children with autism. Their families are often overwhelmed by the enormous task of discerning and providing for their complex needs.



BURTON MORRIS

Returns to Create our Poster 40 Years Later

Burton Morris was born and raised in Pittsburgh and earned his fine arts degree at Carnegie Mellon University in 1986. Burton attended the first PVGP in 1983 when he was a sophomore at CMU, which is adjacent to Schenley Park. He vividly recalls with wonderment attending the first two year's races and observing from Flagstaff Hill. He plans to return in July to watch the races once again.

At the age of three, Burton had an unfortunate accident where he fell off monkey bars and broke his left femur. He was bound in a full body cast for several months, allowing him only to move his arms. His parents gave him crayons and pencils to entertain him and this is when his passion for drawing and painting started. He developed a love for 1960's cartoons. Television shows like the Marvel comic series Captain America and Spiderman gave him an early love for comic book superheroes. Comic books in the early 1960's -70s were a huge source of inspiration for him and are reflected in his artwork today.

Burton Morris is best known for his bold and graphic depictions of American icons. His subject matter includes objects that portray today's popular culture. His distinctive style is characterized by radiant black outlines and vivid colors that emit energy in all of his artwork. Classic shorthand devices are seen in his simplified forms and action lines indicating movement joined with his rich acrylic colors. He imbues his art with his own impeccable style and optimistic frame of mind. His distinctive sword-like slashes suggesting shards of energy come from his study of woodcut prints.




After graduation, Burton worked as an art director for several Pittsburgh advertising agencies, creating television commercials and print ads. The artist established Burton Morris Studios in 1990. That year he began making his small post-Pop icons more impressive by enlarging them onto canvas. He also tightened his brushwork into his present precise style. He would choose one subject per composition to create what he calls "an instant happening" for the viewer.





In 1994 his paintings began to hang on the hit NBC television sitcom "Friends", which continued to showcase his artwork for over ten seasons in the colorful Central Perk coffee shop.

The success of the show becoming a global pop phenomenon helped establish Burton's style and artwork into today's pop culture. Over the years, Burton has produced signature artworks for some of the biggest events in the world, such as the 2004 Summer Olympic Games, The 76th Annual Academy Awards, The 2006 MLB All-Star Game, The 38th Montreux Jazz Festival, the 2010 FIFA World Cup Soccer, The One Young World Summit Conference and the 2016 USGA U.S. Open.



Original artworks have been commissioned for corporations and institutions such as The United Nations, Coca Cola Corporation, Ford Motors, Sony, H.J. Heinz, Chanel Corporation, Rolex, The U.S. State Department, Samsung, Warner Brothers, Lincoln Center, Shake Shack, Perrier, AT&T, Microsoft, and Kellogg's.

Morris' artwork is featured in the collections of The Albright-Knox Museum, The Jimmy Carter Center, The Elysée Museum, The United Nations, The Barack Obama Presidential Center, The World of Coca-Cola Museum and The Academy of Motion Picture Arts & Sciences. Collectors of his work include notable icons Brad Pitt, Kanye West, Tommy Hilfiger, Oprah Winfrey, Stan Lee, Roy Disney, Andre Agassi, Emeril Lagasse to name a few. In addition, his artwork has helped to raise millions of dollars for charities worldwide, including the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix!





Grand Marshal RAY SHAFFER By Ted Sohier

It was July, 1986, just the fourth year of the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix. A teenage racing enthusiast from the South Hills, who'd hungrily read through stacks of hand-me-down Road & Track magazines, heard an interview with a famous driver on the Schenley Park PA system. Bob Akin, who'd just won the Sebring 12-Hour race for the second time that spring, had come to support his son, Bobby, who was racing a vintage Lotus 18 in the PVGP Formula Junior race. Sixteen-year-old Ray Shaffer found Akin and introduced himself. It would be the most significant meeting in Ray's life.

There are many twists and turns to his story, but his path led him in motorsports to managing perhaps the nation's most famous and prestigious Porsche dealership, Brumos, in Jacksonville, Florida. Bob Akin was a business executive and a championship-winning sports car racer who had won the Sebring 12-Hour endurance race twice in Porsches. After Akin introduced Ray to an owner at Brumos, Ray got a job there. Over 15 years, he worked his way through the ranks, finally becom-



ing General Manager. Not solely a Porsche dealership, Brumos ran an extremely successful racing program, fielding two of the great American Porsche drivers, Peter Gregg and Hurley Haywood.

When the owners of Brumos sold the business, Ray moved on to Porsche Cars North America, where he is now Market Development Manager at Porsche Classic in Atlanta. He's also Curator for the Heritage Gallery at the Porsche Experience Center.

Porsche Classic is responsible for spare parts supply and factory restorations of all of the brand's roadapproved classic cars. The range extends from accessories and technical literature to classic spare parts. Porsche is also successively extending its international network with the Porsche Classic Partner program. These are authorized Porsche dealerships with specific expertise in handling classic Porsche cars.

Ray has seldom strayed far from racetracks throughout his career. Once dreaming of becoming a professional race driver, he has competed in Grand Am



GT, and Historic Sportscar Racing (HSR) events, and it's likely he now has access to some very impressive Porsches, both new and classic.

Ray Shaffer comes to Pittsburgh this week as Grand Marshal of the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix, where Porsche is Marque of the Year. He says, "In 1983 (and through the decade of the 80s), the PVGP opened my youthful eyes to an exciting world of automobiles and I simply cannot wait to get back to my hometown to celebrate the 40th anniversary with family, friends and fellow enthusiasts."

It's a homecoming on several fronts for Ray - a return to his hometown and to his alma mater -- and to beautiful Schenley Park, where a chance meeting some 35 years ago started him on a path to a career with perhaps the finest sports and race car brand in the world.





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
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"With Cobra DNA donated by Carroll Shelby himself, the V10 Dodge Viper is raw, capable, brutally powerful, and a 100% American driver's sports car. Viper can go from road course to drag strip, win an autocross, tour a twisty canyon road, and then take your significant other for a weekend in the mountains without so much as changing the tire pressure. Moving Viper from concept show car to production sports car inside a slow moving corporation required a unique and talented group of people. "Team Viper" as they became known, was a gaggle of hot rodders, motorcyclists, Pro-Rallyists, SCCA racers, and drag racers all building economy K-cars and Horizons by day, and racing by night. The man who found these competitive and creative engineers and inspired them to shake a fire breathing 10 cylinder Viper out of a 4-cylinder K-Car company is this year's Honorary Race Director, Roy Sjoberg." ~ Ken Nowak, Team Viper





Roy Sjoberg was recruited to Chrysler from General Motors in 1985 after being the right hand to GM's Zora Arkus-Duntov whom, many may recall as being our honored guest at the 1993 PVGP as the Father of the Corvette. Sjoberg had spent 25 years at GM and had worked with Duntov on a mid-engine Corvette proposal. Duntov was the one who gave Roy the name "Father Viper", after being selected by then Chrysler CEO Lee Iacocca and President Bob Lutz as the first Chief Engineer of Viper in 1989.

Sports car racing had been in Roy's blood since he pit crewed for his brother in the mid-1950s. Roy also raced and this developed into SCCA car preparation. Father Viper's official title though, was Executive Engineer-Viper Project. In that position, he created and managed the Project Team for the Viper's development. He began by inviting a few dozen race-bred Chrysler engineers to a recruiting meeting. As word began to spread within Chrysler, 140 showed up to offer their services. Sjoberg selected 21 engineers, designers, and mechanics, many of whom had pro rally, Team Shelby road racing, or amateur track experience. Roy favored racers because he believed they brought the 'do whatever it takes' attitude.

Chrysler had a \$100M development budget, \$50M of which had been spent on the Mini Van that Roy had headed up before the Viper Project. Roy was told by the CFO that he actually didn't have \$50M, he only had \$49.9M because that, "was essentially zero on the balance sheet to shareholders." The small nimble team worked in a big open floorplan with Roy's desk right in the center of the room.

"He listened to everyone intently for their ideas, from the lead engineers to the guys mopping the floors," said Ken Nowak.

According to Bob Lutz, "Roy Sjoberg would ring a handheld school bell, the signal for everyone to drop what they were doing, gather around and hammer out a solution. This was 'real time, right now' problem solving, with no reports or focus groups to slow its progress." Roy would often be heard saying "Make it Happen," as the decisions of the team where made. This is the 'Platform Team' concept, as opposed to the widely instituted 'Chimney Team' management structure, common at the time and was what created the esprit de corps of Team Viper.



Roy's favorite saying, "If you ain't the lead-dog, the scenery never changes," and was how Team Viper brought the Viper from concept to production in less than 36 months. The Platform Team concept, envisioned by Sjoberg to bring the Viper to production later became the corporate-wide organizational structure for Chrysler.

Sjoberg is a notable keynote speaker on engineering, technical and team building/motivational subjects to such national organizations as SAE, SME, ASME, & ASQC. He has been a consultant to the U.S. Air Force and ARPA on lean product design and team concepts, resulting in a USAF initiative, code named 'Viper'.

Roy is owner of Team R-Squared S LLP, which does automotive consulting and manufactures after-market automotive components. He is the holder of over a half-dozen domestic & international patents and is nationally acknowledged by the Society of Plastics Engineers (SPE) with three Plastic Part of the Year awards and has also received SPE's Lifetime Award for contributions to the plastic industry.

Roy will be speaking on the Podium at Pitt Race during lunch on July 15 and he onstage at Schenley Park on July 23 by several members of Team Viper including:

• Herb Helbig - Chief Engineer. The nickname "Grailkeeper" came about as Herb held off many internal and external forces that wanted to "enhance and civilize" the Viper beyond its original intent, such as automatic transmissions and cup holders.

• Dick Winkles, "Mr. V10" (V-10 Powertrain Chief Engineer). Dick was involved in any and everything performance related at Chrysler over his first 7 years, which included the 2.2L Turbo engines, IMSA RS, SCCA endurance championships, IMSA GTU and Lamborghini F1 racing support.

• Ken Nowak, "Bondo", Senior Engineer - Viper/SRT. Ken was able to assemble a dedicated team of craftsmen and build the Viper White Mule, VMO1. He was the Prototype vehicle build program manager for the Gen I through Gen III Viper, VGX Viper Project, LeMans GTS/R FIA racing cars, RAM SRT and various Indy 500 Pace cars.

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FROM THE 1983 BEGINING 1983 Story and Photos by Michael Sanata

For the 40th year of the PVGP, here is a selection of early photos. Dating from the mid 80s to the early 90s, these images illustrate the first decade of this extraordinary event.

The early pit location was adjacent to Phipps Conservatory. It was not uncommon to see race cars with valid tags that were also street driven, and rare pre-war and European race cars were driven with fervor, at a time when they were viewed as old cars rather than investment items.

These photos show the beginning of a lifetime of photos taken by myself, Michael Sanata and my father. Born in 1981, my parents Larry and Sue, took me to the first year of the event in 1983 as a toddler. From that point, I have continued to return to the races year after year, missing only a handful of events in the ensuing 40 years.



As a child, my father was a newspaper reporter who also wrote freelance automotive features and vintage racing coverage for different car magazines. That enabled us to attend a lot of events for free, as well as pro-



viding us access to restricted areas. In order to benefit from this, both my mother and I were issued press credentials and described as photographers. So starting at age 13, I began to document the PVGP for publication.

In addition to attending the event, my family and I also exhibited our vintage cars at the British Car Shows for many years. I have years of fond memories of riding in the back of my parent's Austin-Healey 3000 Mk.1 and later driving my MGB from our home in Sharspville, PA to Pittsburgh.



In 1999, I enrolled at Ohio Northern University where I majored in Fine Art. During the later years of my studies, I took a photography course. As a result, I found that I could express myself and the events I attended through my photographs. Prior to this, I had half-heartedly taken photos with no thought toward composition, focus or storytelling. My instructor, a professional photographer best known for documenting the ship-



breaking (ship recycling) yards of India, pushed his students to go beyond merely taking a picture to illustrate a story. With this newfound interest in photography, I approached the PVGP with new interest and started to explore Schenley Park as my canvas and the cars and spectators as my characters.

2015 brought about another change in my approach to the event. That year, my family and I acquired North American Classic MG Magazine. This international publication focuses solely on classic MG automobiles. My photography at the PVGP now began to focus mostly on MG cars in competition along with spectator cars.

With nearly 40 years of attending the PVGP and almost 30 years of photographing the event, I am now looking at new ways to challenge my photo skills and maintain my excitement. With such a long history, it is interesting to see how the event has grown and changed.





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For most of the year, Schenley Park could be described as green and serene. Walkers and joggers come by on the trails; family's picnic; golfers drive and putt; bicyclists pedal their way around the circuit roads. But then, something strange happens here one weekend in July. The rolling hills and winding roads are transformed into the nation's most challenging racing circuit.

No racing venue in the country - not a permanent road course, not a temporary street circuit -- presents its competitors with as daunting a lap. The course is lined with curbs, ready to flatten tires or damage a suspension. Its stone walls are notorious threats to the fragile vintage bodywork. The pavement is a public road the rest of the year, and public roads are crowned - higher in the middle - to allow rain runoff. But those crowns tend to throw a speeding car wide off the outside of a turn. Racer Manley Ford says that, because of those crowns, "... for the most part, the track is only half as wide as it looks." Run off the road here, and you might meet one of the park's mature and beautiful trees, along with the aforementioned curbs and walls.

On entering the park or the adjacent golf course, you may hear the race cars in the background, revving their engines in warm up or tuning, or you may hear the passing of a group of cars on the track. These are sounds that excite your soul and alert you to the seriousness of the racing. Many a newcomer has remarked, "You mean to tell me that they are actually racing?" Yes! And with 22 turns and 17 elevation changes, the track is quite challenging and unforgiving to novice and experienced drivers with more than a few accidental smashups or spinouts over the years. If you know anything about racing history these sights and sounds evoke a mind picture of what it must have been like at Watkins Glen, Monte Carlo or the Italian Mille Miglia where crowds stand beside the road as the cars roar past.





Yet, around the golf course are thousands of specialty automobiles, brought here by loving owners to the delight of aficionados and casual spectators alike. There is paint and chrome and wood and upholstery fashioned into vehicles that were once new and now perhaps museum quality.

But the real excitement is in the racing, it is the heart of this event. You are encouraged to find a spot to watch the cars speed past, root for an underdog or applaud a leader, it is racing not seen anywhere else and it belongs to Pittsburgh.



DONNA MAE MIMS M E M O R I A L SPRIDGET RACE The PVGP is hosting a Sprite/Midget ("Spridget") Race pitting Austin

The PVGP is hosting a Sprite/Midget ("Spridget") Race pitting Austin Healey Sprites against their close relatives, MG Midgets. This is part of the Vintage Sports Car Driver's Association's Sprite-Midget Racing Series.

The Pittsburgh version of this series is named in honor of Donna Mae Mims, of Pittsburgh. Known as the "Pink Lady" of racing, she was the first woman to win a Sports Car Club of America road racing National Championship, in 1963. Though she was a Chevrolet "fanatic," a Corvette autocrosser, and a founding member of the Corvette Club of Western Pennsylvania, she won the national title in her pink Austin-Healey "Bugeye" Sprite. It was a car that had once belonged to Dr. Jonas Salk, who developed one of the first successful polio vaccines while a professor at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine.

Donna Mae graduated from Dormont High School in 1945, and worked at racer and racecar builder Don Yenko's Chevrolet dealership in Canonsburg, home of the legendary Yenko Chevrolet Hi-Performance team in the 1960s and 1970s. Donna Mae won her first SCCA race in a Corvette in 1961 at Cumberland, MD. She became a driving instructor, a member of the Board of the Steel Cities Region, SCCA, and a dedicated PVGP volunteer. Inducted into both the Corvette and the SCCA Halls of Fame, Donna Mae Mims had established herself as a formidable competitor in sports car racing, and an active participant in SCCA activities and leadership.

She was a licensed grid worker, editor of the Region's awardwinning magazine, "The Drift," and a freelance writer for several car magazines, including Corvette News and Sports Car Graphic.

Easy to spot in her pink driving suit, pink helmet and pink wig, with "Think Pink" emblazoned on the back of her race car, Mims also competed (with Suzy Dietrich and Janet Guthrie) in the Rolex 24 at Daytona and the 12 Hours of Sebring. Donna Mae also competed with an all-female team in the 1972 running of Brock Yates' Cannonball cross-country event, memorialized in the 1981 film, "Cannonball Run," in which her character was played by actress Adrienne Barbeau.

A warm and generous person who touched many lives, Donna passed away in 2009 at the age of 82.

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LEGENDS OF SCHENLEY PARK

A dream born of the pursuit of racing and altruism

Drivers make our Schenley Park race event possible. We are grateful to all of our drivers and appreciate when they return to race with us each year. To acknowledge them we created the "Legends of Schenley Park" to honor drivers who have raced with us for 15 years.

This tract of land in the heart of Pittsburgh becomes a bridge to a time when legends lived. It is a car lover's dream: a Xanadu for vintage racers, the pursuit of happiness, a new chapter in "The Last Open Road", a road course in the grand style. Now in its 40th year it is also the site for the recognition of The Legends of Schenley Park- an elite group of racers who have competed here for 15 or more years.

Before there could be legends there had to be a track; Imagine a night of revelry back in 1983 where a small cadre of local race fans first brought up the pipe dream of racing on city streets.

The plan was simple; to put together a friendly race on city streets, have fun and funnel all proceeds to charity. Mayor Richard Caliguiri endorsed the plan after it was made clear that a race would benefit charity.

Last year we inducted Joe Parlanti and Peter Patterson into the club. This, our 40th year, we will recognize the newest driving Legends of Schenley Park, all locals: Alan Patterson III of Pittsburgh, Cliff McCandles of Grove City and Kurt Byrnes of Upper St. Clair. They will receive their racing patches on Friday afternoon at the Drivers Meeting.

CONTRIBUTIONS:

The PVGP is a 501 c-3 charity that stages this worldclass event to raise funds to support individuals with autism and intellectual disabilities, through Autism Pittsburgh and Merakey Allegheny Valley School. We are fortunate to have the support of the greater Pittsburgh community to stage our event at Schenley Park since 1983.

Back in 2021, we started asking for a \$5 minimum donation for spectators aged 12 and older, kids under 12 are still free. Our costs to stage this event are significant and we want to help our charity partners. Please help support this great event and its worthy charities. The contribution can be made when you enter the Bob O'Connor Golf Course and the Start/Finish Area or passes can be purchased online to help speed up the process and provide touchless entry.

CODE OF CONDUCT

The PVGP is committed to creating a safe, comfortable, and enjoyable experience for attendees in Schenley

Park and at all of our events. We want anyone attending to enjoy the experience in a responsible fashion. When attending an event you are required to refrain from the following behaviors:

- Behavior that is unruly, disruptive, or illegal in nature is not permitted.
- You will be removed if you are publicly Intoxicated or show other signs of impairment that result in irresponsible behavior.
- Foul or abusive language or obscene gestures will not be tolerated.
- You must follow the instructions of PVGP volunteers and security personnel.
- You are not permitted to display or sell any materials that are deemed by the PVGP to be offensive or discriminatory and without the PVGP's permission.

You are not permitted to display or sell any materials that are deemed by the PVGP to be offensive, discriminatory or that convey hate speech of any type.

WHAT SPECTATORS CAN BRING:

Sunscreen, cameras, coolers, picnic baskets, ponchos, blankets, folding chairs, baby strollers. Food and refreshment stands are available if you wish to purchase on-site.

WHAT SPECTATORS CAN NOT BRING:

Spectators are not permitted to bring pop-up tents (this includes canopies, EZ-Ups, or camping tents) or beach umbrellas. These items are not permitted as they block views and can become a hazard in windy conditions. Cooking grills are not permitted unless you are a sponsor or car club, this includes gas, charcoal, and electric. Only PVGP approved golf carts are allowed on the premises – spectators are not permitted to bring a personal or rented golf cart. Bicycles are not permitted by the Schenley Park Golf Course because of the damage caused on fairways and around the greens. Frisbees and footballs or soccer balls are also not permitted because of the risk to spectators and show cars. Absolutely no weapons or fireworks are allowed.

SPONSORS AND VENDORS:

Organizations and individuals must be official sponsors or vendors of the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix in order to display, market, sell or solicit with Schenley Park or any event venue. Our event benefits charity – please obey our rules and do your part to help our charities. Violators will be removed and possibly prosecuted.

TENTS:

Tents are only permitted if you are an official sponsor, a paying vendor, or a participating car club. Tents must be secured through the PVGP. The Grand Prix rents the golf course for the weekend and has the final approval of any tents or display structures on the property. Spectators are not permitted to bring pop-up tents or beach umbrellas as they block spectator views and can become a safety hazard in windy conditions. This is a charity event run by dedicated volunteers – please cooperate with them, thank you.

REST ROOMS:

There are portable restrooms placed throughout the park for your use. Handicap units are also available. The clubhouse restrooms are not open to the public.

PETS:

Due to the large number of spectators, corporate tents and fast-moving cars we strongly encourage you to not bring dogs or pets to the event. If you choose to bring your dog, you must keep it on a leash and you will be responsible for clean-up and subject to a city fine if not disposed of properly.

PARKING:

Spectator parking is available on Flagstaff Hill, across the street from Phipps Conservatory for a \$25 donation per car per day – proceeds directly benefit our charities. Your donation will also include up to 5 adult event admission wristbands per car. From 9:00 AM through 6:00 PM Free air-conditioned shuttle buses will take you to the golf course or over to the start/finish line. To get there turn right from Forbes Avenue onto Schenley Drive Extension, and proceed through first light and across the bridge. If you want to use a GPS plug in the Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens at One Schenley Park, Pittsburgh, PA 15213. There are parking

lots and garages in Oakland and near Carnegie Mellon - but they do not offer free shuttle buses up the hill to Schenley Park. There is no parking available at the Schenley Park golf course clubhouse.

SHUTTLE BUSES:

The Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix at Schenley Park has grown to the point where we need our own transportation system with a dozen shuttle buses. The shuttle system originates at Flagstaff Hill where all-day public parking is available for a \$25 donation to our charities. Free Show Side shuttles transport guests up to the golf course making stops at Frew Street, European Car Show, American Car Show and Vendor Village. Then it turns left onto Forbes Avenue and returns to Flagstaff Hill. A separate Start/Finish Connector shuttle starts at Flagstaff Hill and goes up Forbes Avenue and stops at Schenley Drive and proceeds to Beacon Street and reverses course. Your \$25 donation will benefit our charities. The parking lot opens at 8:00 AM and shuttles run from 8:00 AM until 6:00 PM

LOST & FOUND:

The Schenley Park Golf Course Clubhouse has a Lost & Found box. The PVGP, its sponsors and car club partners are not responsible for any lost, stolen or damaged personal property.

GOLF CARTS:

Only PVGP volunteers and sponsors/car clubs are permitted to use golf carts. The Golf Course does not own golf carts; the PVGP contracts to bring them in to help run the event. They are not available for rent and cannot be borrowed. You are not permitted to bring your own golf cart or powered cart onto the golf course for liability reasons unless approved by PVGP.

HANDICAP PARKING & ACCESSIBILITY:

The Vietnam Pavilion along the Boulevard of the Allies provides a great view of the track and it is handicap accessible. There is limited free parking available at the Vietnam Pavilion via the Charles Anderson Bridge and Overlook Drive. The Grand Prix does benefit handicapped individuals, but unfortunately, there is very little handicap parking available close to the races and car shows. There is no longer shuttle bus service to and from the Vietnam Pavilion.

FIRST AID:

There is a First Aid station at the Schenley Park Golf Course Clubhouse. Hours of operation are 9:00 AM through 5:00 PM Saturday and Sunday.





PVGP HISTORICS AT PITT RACE



The Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix added a second weekend of racing in 2004. The little brother, known as the PVGP Historics, is now 18 years old and more than ready to stand beside his much older brother, Schenley.

Back to the beginning, in 2003 PVGP Race Director Mike Connolly thought the PVGP should race at the new track in Beaver County called BeaveRun. The dedicated track would allow race cars to compete that were too big and powerful for the Schenley Park course.

19 years later, the PVGP Historics at Pitt Race has developed into a national race event spanning 4 days. This recently expanded purpose-built track highlights American muscle cars and the best of Europe and Asia's sports cars up through the mid 1970's.

Establishing a second weekend of racing puts the PVGP in the rarified air of worldwide racing but alone in vintage racing as the Grand Prix now boasts the ability to host events that are for all types of vintage and historic race cars.

PITTSBURGH INTERNATIONAL RACE COMPLEX SPECTATOR ACTIVITIES



There is more than just historic and vintage racing during the weekend. Visitors have several chances to get behind the wheel and into the action.



VIP PARKING ON SPECTATOR HILL

The expanded track has opened up 2 acres of prime viewing area at the confluence of the North and South Tracks. There is an area available for parking on top of the hill that is reserved for VIP Parking. 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


The Kastner Cup is unlike any other race, run at a different racing facility across North America, in conjunction with various race factions as a stand-alone, annual competition. It is run exclusively by race-prepared Triumph or Triumph powered cars. There is no money to be won or points to be collected, yet, the gentlemanlike competition is thick, and the camaraderie of the teams is unprecedented. Most cars running the annual Triumph race event are members of a group called The Friends of Triumph, a "disorganization" of Triumph racers that span the globe.

The Kastner Cup is raced in honor of R.W. "Kas" Kastner and his accomplishments in Triumph competition. Kastner started off racing a 1958 TR3A where he made a name for himself in the '50s as a well-known production driver. He won the California Sports Car Club Championship for his class in 1959, so he knew how to throw a car around the track. He became Chief Instructor at Riverside Raceway for the California Sports Car Club for many years and held the position of the SCCA National Licensing Chairman as well.

For 50-plus years, Kas was influentially relevant in the automotive industry. He developed parts and processes that have changed performance and standard vehicles alike with his design, production, and sales of high-performance engine, suspension, turbocharger, and brake systems, as well as aerodynamic work to improve performance. He was especially prominent as an expert in racing team management with a winning history.

In 1970, R.W."Kas" Kastner resigned from Triumph and started Kastner Brophy Racing with friend John Brophy. They were competing in Formula 5000, the Trans Am Series in the Under 2L Class in a Triumph Vitesse (The Candybox) wheeled by Carl Swanson, and they also took on the Roy Woods program.

Each top performing model of Triumph in the Kastner Cup is presented a Peggy Kastner Performance Award, based on time and performance on track during the Kastner Cup race. The Kastner Cup Champion in the past was chosen by R.W. "Kas" Kastner himself. His decision was based 50% on track performance, 25% enthusiasm in vintage racing, and 25% presentation of the car. With the passing of Kas Kastner in 2021, this year's duties of appointing the Kastner Cup Champion will go to Mr. Robert Johns, VTR and British Sports Car Hall of Fame inductee. The Champion will hold the Cup for a year until it is presented to the next year's recipient, their name scribed on a plaque attached to the Cup.



Robert Johns was born in Bradford, PA and began working in his father's auto repair shop at the age of twelve, which fueled his interest in racing. By age nineteen, he was full-fledged, fast-car crazy. In fact, he attended the last two original-course races at Watkins Glen in 1951 and 1952.

Robert Johns enlisted in the Air Force in 1954 and was stationed in Europe. In 1955, he started his career off with a 2nd place overall at the BSCC Gymkhana in Eschternach, Luxembourg. He earned a 2nd place in the BSCC Hill Climb, again in Eschternach, and a 5th place at the HMSC race at the Air Base in Phersfeld, Germany. During the HMSC Flying Mile trials in Mainz, Germany, he took his first win in the Up to 2000cc class and 2nd overall with a speed of 112mph. He secured a 1st place win in Class E 2000cc and a 1st overall in the annual lap time record at Nurburgring.

In 1956, he successfully completed and received his Certificate of Excellence at the Swiss Automobile Club Racing Driver's school in Monza, Italy, and gained several more Firsts.

All of these events were run while he continued to serve in the Air Force, including five months in North Africa. These were all impressive and he made a name for himself while he fulfilled his duty to our country.

In October 1956, at the SCCA Regionals in Fort Sumner, New Mexico, he claimed a 2nd place finish in E Production in the 25.6-mile race and another 2nd in the 75-mile race, his second favorite race. Also, in October, he chalked up a win and 2nd overall in E Production at the SCCA Hill Climb in Albuquerque, New Mexico and 2nd overall in the SCCA Pecos Valley photo rally.

These events set the stage for Bob's entry in the FIA World Sports Car Championship's 12-hour Florida International Grand Prix for the Amoco Trophy in 1957, with his TR3 crossing the line as 19th overall and 1st in the Grand Touring 2000.

Shortly after, Bob retired from racing. He is a VTR Hall of Famer and was an inductee in the British Sports Car Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 2017.

The ceremony will be held Friday evening at Pitt Race at the Kastner Cup tent.

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THE RACING DOLAN'S

Jim Dolan attended the first PVGP event in 1983 at Schenley Park, but only as a spectator with third son Brian in tow as a newborn. He was just starting a family and racing was out of the question.

As the years passed the Dolan boys raced go karts in the driveway at their Fox Chapel home and it was serious competition. Lap times were kept! The boys had a particular passion for competing during rain showers to see who could do the longest drifts around the "skid pad" circle!

Around 1992, Dad completed a driving school at Mid-Ohio and began vintage racing with his 427 Cobra and then the Group 44 GT6. After catching the racing bug, he successfully passed on the affliction to his sons Brian, Peter and Charlie, who all attended various years of the Panoz driving school at Road Atlanta during the early 2000's. Racing license in hand and with a generous sponsor in Dad, the Dolan's took to racing primarily big bore Mustangs, Tigers and Shelby cars at some of America's greatest road courses.







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It wasn't until the early 2010's that Brian mentioned to his father - "Why aren't we racing at the PVGP?" Jim finally caught the bug, initiating the restoration of his Group 44 1971 Triumph GT6. In 2012, a west coast '57 MGA arrived in Pittsburgh for Charlie to pilot at Schenley Park. It had raced at the Monterey Historics 7 times! In 2013 they expanded their commitment by bringing the big-bore Mustangs and Sunbeam Tiger to the PVGP Historics at Pitt-Race...and the commitment has continued to deepen!

Which brings us to the irrational commitment to Triumph. The Triumph Marque has a special place in the Dolan Racing stable. Jim was always a fan of Bob Tullius and Group 44 Racing, so when the iconic Group 44 GT-6 came up for sale Jim snapped it up. Brian Fuerstenau raced the Group 44 GT6 in 22 races in 1972 - taking first in 17 races and second in 3. Tullius won driving the car at Watkins Glen driving with a broken leg! In 1973 the car started 10 races, finishing first every time with John Mc-Comb as driver. Later, when the Kastner Brophy GT6 #6 car became available Jim knew of its historic significance and tracked down Kas Kastner to confirm it was really his former car. There were now 2 Triumph race cars. In preparation for the 2018 Kastner Cup which was coming to the PVGP at Pitt Race, two more race prepared GT6's were sourced so that the four Dolan's could run for bragging rights. Dad won the Kastner Cup that year.

Recently Brian picked up the colorful Kastner-Brophy "Candy Box", a rare '71 Triumph Vitesse built by Kastner



for the IMSA 2 Liter Trans Am series. It'll make its Pittsburgh debut this summer at the PVGP.

Brian and his family were fortunate to become close to Kas. They developed a friendly banter and semi-grandfatherly relationship - sharing emails about the race prep of the cars and updating Kas on Brian's 7 kids and his supportive wife Allison.

What makes the PVGP so special?

Jim: Nothing compares to the course at Schenley Park, the stonewalls, the haybales, no room for error. You watch vintage races from places like Monaco or Watkins Glen, it's all guardrails and catchfences. At Schenley it is parking meters and light poles! The comradery among the racers who gather under the trees in the paddock is special. There's shared experience of bringing it home safely and a real sense of courage to successfully turning smart laps at Schenley.

Brian: For me it's the fact that I have two world class racing venues within an hour of my house and I get to sleep in my own bed!

Charlie: The track is the most intimidating he's ever raced on – inches away from the stone walls and no room for a mistake. Charlie is a familiar sight on the podium at Schenley, capturing the most wins among his siblings in the '57 MGA that is well suited for Schenley Park.

A third generation of Dolan's is waiting in the wings -Brian's sons are practicing in the rain on the "skid pad" every chance they get!

Come out and watch the Dolan's race both weekends this year. The family is also very active in the organizing and running of the PVGP, assisting on various committees and serving as ambassadors for the event as they travel the globe. Jim, who just happens to be the Chairman of the PVGP Board, is racing his GT40 at the Le Mans Classic in France just a few weeks before the PVGP!

VINTAGE RACER GROUP

The Vintage Racer Group and the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix combine efforts at the Historics at Pitt Race. This team combines the foremost vintage racing organization in the East with one of the premier race events in the country. The majority of competitors at the Historics are VRG members and they also represent a large portion of PVGP racers in Schenley Park the following weekend. The VRG is a non-profit vintage race organization, run by racers, for racers. It is best known for its focus on safety and for its ability to run efficient race events. The addition of the PVGP Historics to the VRG schedule puts this great event in the middle of a race season that begins in April at VIR, with race weekends at The Jefferson 500 at Summit Point in May, Thompson Vintage Motorsport Festival in June, the Lime Rock Historic Festival and and VRG at the Glen in September, New Jersey Historics at New Jersey Motorsports Park in October, and finishes with the Turkey Bowl at Summit Point in November.

VRG Mission:

To promote the active use of vintage and historic sports and racing cars, in a format that emphasizes safety and enjoyment for all participants. Specifically, we will organize, sanction, and conduct vintage races for a broad range of cars, in the northeastern United States.

VRG Philosophy:

A vintage sports car can be best appreciated by being driven, in an environment for which it was intended. This form of use will encourage the acquisition, restoration, and preservation of these vehicles by current and future generations. Our emphasis is on the drivers: safe drivers, protected by their conduct and their car preparation, by their attitude and spirit on and off the track. Our events will encourage friendly, safe competition, among members with mutual respect for other participants and reverence for the historic nature of the cars. In 2004 a couple of vintage racers got together and said, "What if we started our own club". They started



calling around to other racing friends and asking the same question along with "and if you did start up in a new club what would you want from it?"

Well, it seems that it boiled down to three things, Safety, Safety, & Safety. It was unanimous - if you got that part right, car safety, driver safety and a safe attitude - everything else would just follow. It appears that they were correct. After starting in 2004 with one event, the New Hampshire Vintage Festival, they quickly added the PVGP Historics and kept right on from there. VRG is now one of the largest vintage racing groups in the country, with a schedule that spans a wide range of tracks and a full year.

Cool Cars, Safe Racing, Great Friends' is VRG's motto, and the results over 18 years are testimony to its success. The VRG driver's school, run each year at Summit Point, is professional quality and a great way to enter vintage racing. Thorough technical inspection and an objective, conscientious driver's committee helps all the drivers to have a safe and enjoyable race. Active member support gives our paddocks and race venues a relaxed and welcoming atmosphere

The VRG Car Eligibility cutoff is 1989 for most production-based cars, but some classes allow cars through 1993 and special rules exist for factory race cars like Formula Ford and Sports 2000. Historical correctness is key, and the VRG eligibility committee and technical inspection team are thorough but fair in their review. From the 1950s to the 1980s, 850cc to 350cid, purposebuilt racer to 4-door sedan - we encourage all cool cars and safe drivers to come check VRG out! PITTSBURGH INTERNATIONAL RACE COMPLEX




Both the PVGP and the Steel Cities SCCA call this track home and for good reason, it is a world-class facility just 40 minutes up the road.

Under significant development since Kathy and Jim Stout's purchase of the facility in 2011, the highlight of the 400+ acre Pitt Race facility is a flowing, high-speed 2.8-mile asphalt racing circuit annually hosting a variety of automotive and leading motorcycle events. The track can be divided into a north circuit and a south circuit as needed for its customers. Also onsite is a 0.8-mile karting track designed by well-known course designer, Alan Wilson. The karting facility entertains families, aspiring drivers, and professionals, as well as some motorcycles. The neighboring six-acre skid pad provides ample room for testing, autocross, and specialized training in an assortment of performance and evasive driving maneuvers.

The Stout's dedication and investment in the facility are a tribute to their focus on customer service. "The past couple of years obviously presented many challenges for Pitt Race, but also several opportunities," said Kathy Stout. "We continued our plan of improvements, with a focus on more outdoor recreational events for our community and customers and adding amenities for the comfort and enjoyment of anyone attending our facility, such as our new headquarters building and Pro Shop. INTERNATIONAL CAR SHOW AT SCHENLEY PARK

There are very few auto races that also provide the diversion of a car show. At the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix in Schenley Park, we don't offer a few cars, we give you nearly 3,000 of them – from all brands, on the golf course overlooking the vintage races. And some are museum pieces from around the world!

Bill Roberts proposed the idea of an invitational affair in our second year, in 1984, when a small but magnificent display was assembled at the Frick Fine Arts Museum in Oakland just a short walk from the paddock in front of Phipps Conservatory. The show grew in 1985, with cars being shown on Flagstaff Hill. Then Larry Smith stepped in to take us to the next level - pre-

senting the cars on the Schenley Park golf course. Our award for the Outstanding Car Show Committee person is named after Larry.

Since 2006, Bob Speer has been the Showside Director and has guided and nurtured the show into one of the country's largest in terms of participants, variety and quality. It encompasses the entire golf course - one square mile of cars, tents and displays. It is a daunting challenge to arrange a large-scale weekend car show. According to Dan DelBianco, PVGP executive director "with the added logistics of working around putting greens, tee boxes, environmentally restricted areas and a live race track you can well imagine the enormity of it all. Bob is the perfect person to direct it - his knowledge of cars is unlimited and his ability to lead and inspire others is strongly rooted in his faith and experience as a worship leader. Bob, along with his family and his team of car club volunteers do it all with a hearty smile and boundless enthusiasm."

Always one to share the credit, Bob Speer praised the Car Show Committee saying "our volunteers are the lifeblood of the organization. The car shows have grown dramatically, and that growth continues in 2022. We literally could not put on the event without our volunteers. In my role as the Director of Show side activities, I am blessed to have many relied upon volunteers who have also become friends. I believe that the car shows are a wonderful compliment to the vintage racing."

The International Car Show at Schenley Park is arranged by geographic region of manufacture. The show is open to any type of car and all car clubs are welcome. Starting at the base of Schenley Drive, you will find German Hill, featuring the car clubs for Porsche, BMW, Volkswagen, Audi, and MINI. Typically, you will find the Mercedes-Benz Club there, but they have graciously agreed to move up a few fairways to make room for the spectacular display planned by John Malobicky and the Allegheny Region of the Porsche Club of America. John and his team have been working for several years to stage a spectacular Porsche Marque Display - be sure to visit and watch the races from their area at the exciting turn 13.

British Car Day, hosted by the Western PA Triumph Association on Saturday, sits at the top of the course and features Triumph, Aston Martin, MG, Austin-Healey, Jaguar, Bentley, Rolls Royce, Lotus, and Morgan just to name a few. Many thanks to the clubs that participate and bring more than 500 cars.

The Asian display along Schenley Drive continues to grow and includes Mazda, Subaru, Nissan, Honda, Toyota and Mitsubishi. The largest representation is from the West Penn Miata Club.

The American Car Show is on the clubhouse side of Schenley Drive and is an excellent representation of classic and modern-day cars. All brands are there with a large presence from Ford, Chevrolet, Pontiac, Mercury, Buick, Chrysler, Plymouth, Dodge and Packard. Corvettes return to the American Car Show after moving across the street in 2021 to put on a spectacular show with 325 Vettes as Marque of the Year. The Pitt Birds Thunderbird Club is ever present with a show of these Ford classics. There is also a display of military and spe-



cialty vehicles each year and the army Jeeps and their uniformed crews provide the color and pageantry for our national anthem during the Opening Ceremony on the track at turn 15.

On the 18th fairway beside the Pittsburgh Golf Club, you will find the "Cortile della corsa" or Italian Racing Courtyard. It features every Italian marque with an abundance of Ferrari, Fiat, Lamborghini, and Alfa Romeo. Maserati has been selected as the featured Proiettore Macchina. The Cortile now welcomes all French manufactured cars in the new French Quarter that includes Alpine, Bugatti, Citroën, Peugeot and Renault. They are invited, to not only showcase their cars on the Cortile Showfield but also to join them in lunch and all of the other festivities at the Cortile.

Next to the Cortile in 2022, you will find the Viper Spotlights Display. Look for some special early racing Vipers and meet Roy Sjoberg and Team Viper.

Pittsburgh Cars 'N' Coffee displays near the clubhouse where they showcase over 50 exotic cars. Cliff Laschon and his team keep upping the quality and variety of this "must-see show".

There are also shows staged by All Squad and Steel City Society. These are social car clubs and their members bring cars from all manufacturers. Hagerty is a sponsor again and puts on their own car show for customers overlooking turn 17 on Saturday.

We're not limited to just automobiles as we now have a vintage motorbike display on the golf course at the corner of Darlington Road and East Circuit Drive. Ton-Up Pittsburgh is returning to manage the Motorbike Show that gets better each year.

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


A MOST APPROPRIATE MARQUE FOR OUR 40TH

From the beginning, the Porsche brand represented racing and luxury. The founder, Ferdinand Porsche, was once the chief engineer at Mercedes-Benz, and he spent time at Volkswagen. Porsche began his own company in 1931, naming the company after himself. After that, Porsche began producing vehicles that would go on to become legendary for performance and quality.

The very first Porsche was named the 'Porsche 64' and released in 1938, the model's unique design and upscale vibe immediately caught on with buyers. The company's growth was impeded when the war began, forcing Porsche to develop tanks instead of automobiles. However, the company bounced back in 1947, when the Grand Prix racing car made its debut. The next year Ferdinand's son Ferry Porsche created the company's first-ever sports car - the 356.







By the 60s, Porsche was designing and producing popular sports cars that debuted with much anticipation at the Frankfurt International Auto Show every year. Then, in 1964, a legend was born when the first-ever Porsche 911 was introduced. Over the next few decades, Porsche continued to expand and perfect its lineup, The 1995 Porsche 911 Turbo was the first vehicle to ever have onboard computer diagnosis, something that would revolutionize the auto service industry.


To this day, Porsche has maintained its status as a producer of unparalleled supercars and racing innovations. The 911 is perhaps the most iconic and versatile model under the brand's name, with over 20 different models and seven trim levels.

But Porsche isn't resting on their laurels as they blaze a path with electric vehicles for more performance in everyday life and more sustainable mobility. 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A BRIEF BRUMOS HISTORY Brumos

Editors note: The number 59 Brumos Porsche 911 on the 2022 PVGP poster was created by artist Burton Morris and represents one of the most famous racing teams of our time and is one of the most recognized Porsche liveries: Brumos Racing. Furthermore, our Grand Marshal, Ray Shaffer worked at Brumos for 15 years.

Mention the Brumos Racing Team and most diehard fans will wax poetically about the 1970s, when drivers Peter Gregg, Hurley Haywood, and crew chief Jack Atkinson dominated the American GT racing scene. But the real story stretches into the earliest days of the 20th Century and includes some of the seminal figures in American motoring history.

In the late 1940s, Ira Brundage was hot rodding a 1930 Duesenberg Indianapolis racer with a flathead Ford engine he bought from Andy Granatelli. It was that connection that led to Ira and his son Hubert into racing in the first SCCA races at Watkins Glen, Sebring, Bridgehampton, and many of the runway circuits scattered around the Southeast under the banner of Brundage Motors. It



was merely coincidence that Max Hoffman and Briggs Cunningham were driving the first two Porsches in the United States at the 1950 Watkins Glen Grand Prix. With that siting, Hubert Brundage fell in love with the cars and forged a near-decade long quest to gain a Porsche distributorship under the name of the Brumos Porsche Car Company (shortened from BRUndage MOtorS). By the time of his passing in late 1964, Brumos had a distribu-



tion network supplying Volkswagens to four states and Porsches to 10 states in the southeastern United States. In 1960 and 1961, the Brumos Racing Team amassed a stellar racing history that included class wins and overall podiums in the 12 Hours of Sebring with Brumos a driver lineup that included Bob Holbert and Roger Penske.

The Brumos dealership was sold to a 25-year-old Navy Lieutenant Peter Gregg. Gregg saw owning a Porsche dealership as the perfect way to further his racing career with access to the best cars and technological help that Porsche could supply.

Gregg eventually encountered a 19-year-old Hurley Haywood at a parking-lot autocross and fostered his entry at the 1969 Six Hours of Watkins Glen, where the pair won their class, and gave Haywood his first professional win.

The rest of the 1970s was one of Brumos dominance on the American racing stage as Gregg, backed by his crew chief Jack Atkinson, took a total of five IMSA championships, four Trans-Am championships, and several important sports-car races with the Porsche Carrera RSR, the 934.5, and 935. Haywood, for his part had strong showings in every series he entered, taking his first of three Le Mans wins in 1977 codriving with Jacky Ickx and Jürgen Barth. By 1990, Peter Gregg's wife was ready to move on and sold the Brumos dealership to Dan Davis, who fielded a championship-winning team in the Bridgestone Super-Car series with Porsche 911s for drivers Hurley Haywood and Hans Stuck.

The new millennium saw Brumos joining the NAS-CAR-supported Rolex Grand-Am series, where it fielded a two-car team of Porsche-powered Daytona Prototypes The year 2011 saw the Brumos team return to its GT roots and take another season-long championship with a 911-based race car.



The team withdrew from professional racing in 2013, though Patrick Dempsey/John Wright Racing took third in class at the 2015 24 Hours of Daytona in Brumos colors. When the dealerships were sold in 2016 to the Field Group, Dan Davis kept all rights to the Brumos name and immediately began work on The Brumos Collection. The museum near Ponte Vedra, Florida opened to the public in January 2020 as one of the most beautiful and extensive automotive collections in the world, including many of the team cars reaching back to the 1960s.

The PVGP thanks Sean Cridland and Brandon Starks of the Brumos Collection for working with us this year to transform the Brumos livery to celebrate our 40th!

Allegheny Region Porsche Club of America: There is No Substitute.

A very young Tom Cruise famously uttered the above phrase in the 1983 movie Risky Business, and it's as true today as it was then. The Allegheny Region Porsche Club of America (ARPCA) hosts the 2022 PVGP Marque of The Year display. Here's why you shouldn't miss it: the people are engaging, the raffle prizes are great, and most of all, because nearly every car is a unique, one-of-a-kind iteration of the brand.

Unlike other manufacturers, Porsche only builds cars to spec, whether that of the individual customer or of the dealer. Beyond that, the number of options for each car is astronomical. Consider the Porsche Rennbow (PCA's listing of Porsche colors). As of April 2022, it contains more than 500 colors; 27 shades of yellow alone. And that's just the beginning.

Chris Tsui, of the online newsletter The Drive, wrote in 2019 that a 991 generation Carrera S could be configured in 7800 distinct combinations of drive train, transmission, hardtop or convertible, wheel choices (5), upholstery choices (15) and colors (13, unless you chose one of the custom color options). With those choices alone the chance of two random customers ending up with identically built cars is infinitesimally small. Then add custom stitching options, which, if any interior parts are to be paint matched to the exterior, different sound systems, different exhaust systems, brakes (2), several types of seats.... The list isn't endless, but it seems like it.

ARPCA expects to have 300 Porsches from at least 17 states on display on the Schenley Park golf course

in addition to several more that will be racing on the course.

Our raffle, the proceeds of which exclusively benefit the PVGP charities, has prizes that are second to none, including a trip to the Porsche Experience Center in Atlanta, Georgia. Come take a shot at winning a great prize and supporting PVGP.

Finally, "It's not the cars, it's the people." That's the Porsche Club of America motto. PCA has 134,000 members in 146 local regions; the largest single marque car club in the world. Twenty-five years ago, ARPCA had 432 members; today 1367. A club does not enjoy that type of growth based on the car alone. Our shared passion for the cars may bring us together, but that's just a starting point for lifelong friendships that develop.

We're not only friendly, we're generous. Many of our events have a charitable fundraising component. In 2020 we contributed more than \$10,000 to foodbanks. Since 2011 ARPCA raised \$199,000 for the PVGP charities.

ARPCA has room for everyone at the table: we have High-Performance Drivers Education; a four-door group; monthly lunch meet-ups at different locations within a one or two-hour drive of Pittsburgh; a women's group; monthly outdoor breakfast gatherings May through September; a People's Choice car show at the Grand Concourse in August, and other events throughout the year. Whatever your interest, we have something for you. Come and meet us!





A century of motorsports By Ted Sohier



We're celebrating 40 years of the PVGP this summer. Our first event was held on Labor Day weekend, 1983 and lasted exactly one day. Now, of course it's expanded to ten days of events, with vintage car races on two weekends, on two different courses. But one thing hasn't changed over the years - the parallel goal of raising funds for charities that help citizens in our community.

We are proud of our 40 years, but our sports car races have a much older heritage. The Steel Cities Region of the Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) put on one of the first post-war sports car race weekends sanctioned by the SCCA in July, 1953. It was held on the runways and taxiways of the Cumberland, Maryland, Municipal Airport. It drew 80 competitors and hundreds of spectators. It was supported in part by the Lions Club of Cumberland, who partnered with Steel Cities to raise funds for charity.



The Cumberland race continued and grew every year in entrants, spectators, and funds raised, and when the Federal Aviation Administration pulled in the reins on use of the airport there, Steel Cities moved the event to the road race course at Nelson Ledges, Ohio. Despite the change in venue, the annual series of SCCA National-level continued to be called the Cumberland Nationals. For several years, the "Cumberland" shifted to the airport in Connellsville, PA. Finally, a dedicated road race course was constructed in Wampum, Beaver County. It was called BeaveRun at the time, but now under new ownership and management, and with a greatly improved facility and longer race course, it is a world-class facility called Pittsburgh International Race Complex, or simply Pitt Race.

Steel Cities held its 70th Cumberland Classic, now an SCCA "Super Tour" event in April, 2022 at Pitt Race. It's the longest continuously running series of SCCA sports car races in the nation. Many of the volunteers you see working the racing portion of the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix come from the Steel Cities Region- SCCA, helped in Cumberland. As old as the Cumberland series is, though we can trace automobile racing in the Pittsburgh area back much farther -in fact, to the very early years of the 20th Century.



In the spring of 1901, the weekly journal, Index of Pittsburg Life, appointed Eloise Lorne as its autom bile columnist. In the March 9th issue, she wrote that, "At present, there are two hundred machines of six different makes in Pittsburg." The Pittsburgh Auto Club was founded that spring, with a membership of 50 motorists. In 1903, local enthusiasts got a taste of motor racing in the 1903 Pittsburgh-to-New York endurance run, which covered 797 miles between New York and Pittsburgh, by way of Cleveland. It was sponsored by the National Association of Automotive Manufacturers.








At least two races were staged in the city that year - in June and July, 1903, both in Highland Park. Gasoline, steam and electric cars competed in their own classes, and the North Side's W. Henry Artzberger won the steam category in both meets in a car of his own manufacture. Take a look at the Artzberger Steam Surry, built around 1904, in the William H. Artzberger collection at the Car & Carriage Museum at The Frick Art & Historical Center in Point Breeze.



So, please enjoy the 40th year of the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix, but know that enthusiasm in motor sports in our region has a much longer history!

Louis Chevrolet, 27-year-old Swiss-born French race driver working for the U. S. Fiat distributor, won three races in Pittsburgh in June, 1905. He was driving an 861 cubic-inch, 90 horsepower Fiat on an oval horse track on Brunot's Island, in the Ohio River just downstream from the city. In fact, Louis won three of four events in which he was entered, defeating, among others, the legendary Barney Oldfield in his Peerless, called the "Green Dragon." The July 1905 issue of the magazine "The Motor Way" claimed that 6,000 spectators came out for the first of the two race days, and some 5,000 on the second.







PVGP SPREADS WINGS TO BUTLER COUNTY

The Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix is pleased to celebrate its 40th Anniversary by welcoming the Passport to Elegance Hangar Party to a new home in Butler County.

"We are thrilled to bring the Passport to Elegance party back to our Race Week Calendar after being unable to host the event during the pandemic. This 'Can't Miss' party will take place in the two original hangars of the Pittsburgh Butler Regional Airport. We have received overwhelming support from everyone involved at the airport and we are excited to share the Grand Prix with the residents of Butler County" says PVGP Executive Director Dan DelBianco.



Amelia Earhart received her instrument training and had long-range fuel tanks installed on her Lockheed Vega at the airport. In 1932 she flew the single-engine Vega across the Atlantic Ocean and eventually nonstop across the U.S. A custom painting celebrating this history donated by Butler artist Tom Panei will be auctioned at the event.



Aircraft on display will include a 1939 Spartan Executive made available by Jim and Anita Savage. The Spartan Executive was designed as a civilian aircraft built in Tulsa, OK, but this Spartan was purchased by the British Government in 1940 to provide advanced training to US pilots who would serve as fighter pilots in the American Eagle Squadrons. Five pilots who trained in the aircraft would go on to achieve recognition as a World War II Ace. After the War, this Spartan returned to the civilian registry, and it survives today as a shiny example of one of the finest airplanes designed and built during the Golden Age of Aviation.



Guests at the party have rubbed shoulders with Indy 500 champion Bobby Rahal, climbed aboard B-17 and B-25 bombers, experienced the thunder and performance of a P-51 Mustang and got up close and personal with cars having rich racing history. This year, the event celebrates the elegant automotive history of the art-deco era by featuring a 1929 Duesenberg made available through the Swigart Museum, Packards and a Isotta Fraschini.

During the event, guests will have the chance to win a private champagne tour of the region abroad a twinengine Beechcraft King Air. At the end of the night, one lucky guest at each event has walked away with first-class round-trip plane tickets to their destination of choice donated by sponsor Delta Airlines.

Co-chairs Eric Zagrocki and Susan Gera orchestrate the transformation of the airfield into a night like no other - Pittsburgh's finest and most unique transportationfocused charity party of the summer. Rare and exotic multi-million dollar performance machines fill the hangar and tarmac where discerning guests arrive to a red carpet to imbibe in premium spirits, international gourmet cuisine, good friends and a shared enthusiasm for all the PVGP represents.





WE HAVE A PLACE FOR YOU

As I parked my Corvette in the Schenley Park car show to watch the races at the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix in 1985, I noticed a booth with a 'Volunteer' sign and I was curious as to what a volunteer would do exactly.

I walked over to inquire and was greeted by a very tall man who introduced himself as Dan Torisky, a volunteer for the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix. He asked me if I was interested in helping. I said "sure, I can help for a few hours," as those words came out of my mouth, Dan said, "OK Little Cathy, we need help directing traffic."

The Clubhouse was and still is, the center of all activity during the Schenley park week end. In the past we would make signs on the Friday night prior to the event using large sheets of heavy colored card stock and thick markers....Road Closed, No Parking etc. Today, we are placing signs, building ramps, setting up car show areas, getting golf carts ready...the list of efforts seems endless. And it does not end until the show and races are over.

Now it is 2022 and we are celebrating our 40th year, and while many things have changed, the one constant is the dedication of our volunteers, whether it be on Race Side or Show Side; a team of over 1,000 people who are dedicated to each other, this event and our charities.

A WORD FROM DAN TORISKY



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
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
